Farmers To Nominate Candidates For ASC Community Posts

Nicholas County farmers will have the opportunity to nominate by petition, candidates for ASC community committee posts. The nominating period will begin July 28 and close Aug. 17. "This year we hope farmers in Nicholas County will nominate by petition full states for all five communities. A full state means a minimum of six candidates to choose from in electing a community committee of three members and two alternates," Harvey Wagner, chairman of the Nicholas County ASC Committee, said. All ASC community committees are elected annually. The newly-elected community committeemen will convene shortly after their September election to elect one new ASC county committee member and two alternates. County committee members serve three-year terms, with one new member elected each year. Alternates are elected annually. Mr. Wagner explained that the County ASC committee administers agricultural programs such as marketing quotas and acreage allotments, price-support loans and purchases, conservation cost-sharing, and other farm action programs at the county level, deal-

ing directly with producers. Community committees not only elect county committee members and alternates, but also help the County Committee administer these programs. "There's no red tape tied up in nominating a community committee candidate by petition," Mr. Wagner said. "All that's really needed is a sheet of paper naming a candidate—and six or more signatures of eligible voters. Petitions are limited to one signature each, but voters may sign as many petitions as they want. A farmer who is an owner, tenant, or sharecropper is an eligible voter in the community where his farm interests lie. He can only nominate and vote in one community, however, even if he has farm interests in more than one."

The ASC Committee chairman said that if at least six eligible candidates are nominated by petitions submitted by farmers in these communities, no other nominations need be made. However, if less than six are nominated by petition, the incumbent community committee will complete the slate, selecting candidates actively engaged in farming.

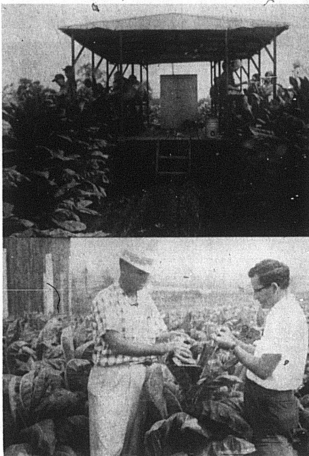
Housing Available In FHA Project

Nicholas County Tobacco Field Day Is August 5

The Annual Nicholas County Tobacco Field Day will be held at the Clay Seed Farm Wednesday, Aug. 5. The group will assemble at the barn on Walnut Grove Road where they will load wagons for a tour of the farm. James Heron, Weed Control Specialist from University of Kentucky will be in charge of the first stop and will discuss Herbicides for weed control in tobacco. Ira Massey will be at the next stop and will demonstrate new materials for sucker control. Clay Seed personnel will talk about their growing out plots and pollution for producing Burley Hybrids. Joe Smiley will be in charge of the variety test plots and Glen Collins, from the Agronomy Department, University of Kentucky, will talk about off-type Burley plants. The Black Shank resistance plots will have Paul Legg, University of Kentucky Agronomist, in charge. The field day will give Burley producers a choice to hear specialists discuss the latest information on tobacco production. The tobacco program will include Ira Massey, Louis Leon, Burley producer from Mercer County and State Farm Bureau president who will discuss some ideas for future burley program. County growers are invited to attend.

City Council Holds Regular Meeting

City Council held its regular meeting Monday night at 7:30 p.m. in the City Auditorium. Mayor Bill Booth absent.

City Engineer, engineer for Howard K. Bell Consulting Engineers of Lexington, announced that the construction on the water project has now been completed. He recommended that final payments be made to the two contractors. Council voted to pay Caldwell Tank Company's final bill of \$24,116 with the year's guarantee starting July 27, 1970 in the two tanks which were installed at Blue Grass Kitting. It also voted to make the final payment of \$5,558.39 to Clark, Wood and Association with the guarantee date effective May 1, 1970, on the new pump and motor at the river and on the foundation for the two tanks. Of the \$210,000 set aside in the bond issue, approximately \$25,000 will remain after the final payments.

Building permits were granted to Julian W. Green to build a carport on Sycamore Hill and to Mrs. Lena Pumphrey to tear down and rebuild a rock wall on North Street.

Burl Hunt's resignation as special policeman was accepted. James E. Mitchell has been hired to replace him.

Council voted to purchase 1971 cars for the Police Department for \$180 (2,000 at .09 each) and 1,000 receipts at \$30. It also voted to buy at Adore's adding machine at a cost of \$349.95 minus 10% minus the \$50 rent already applied to it. Additionally, it bought a desk and chair for the Police Department for \$130.

Wick Operations Manager and Water Plant Supervisor, made several recommendations to Council regarding work schedules and purchases. All were accepted.

Mayor Bill Power suggested that Council inform the City Clerk of any items to be brought before Council on Thursday before Monday's meeting in order that an agenda may be mailed ahead of time.

Council voted to change Margaret Wade, assistant to the City Clerk, a regular employee into a seasonal employee. She will be eligible for employee benefits.

The next regular meeting will be held on Aug. 10 at 7:30 p.m.

Rabies Clinic Scheduled July 31 and August 1

The Nicholas County Health Department has announced that it will conduct a two day clinic for the vaccination of dogs for the dreaded disease of rabies.

The Rabies Control Law, which requires all dogs over six months of age to be vaccinated against rabies, makes an owner liable for any person bitten by an unvaccinated dog, if the dog is rabid.

Due to the serious rabies outbreak in Kentucky this year and the fact that the outbreak occurred in an area not far from our town, it is strongly emphasized by the Health Department, that every dog owner have his dog or dogs vaccinated. Even though the reservoir of rabies lies in our wildlife the most effective barrier between the wildlife and the woods and the

clinics are as follows: Friday, July 31, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Nicholas County Health Center. Saturday, Aug. 1, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Nicholas County Health Center.

The usual charge of \$150 for a three year vaccination under these Health Department sponsored clinics will be in effect.

Kelly announced that the program will include entertainment by the Disteland Fire.

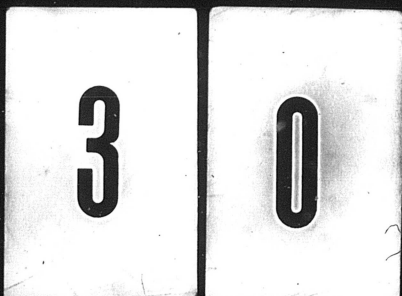
