Agree Or Not I say What I Think

FRANKFORT: In the space of two sentences Budget Director James E. Lockett said he was optimistic to pessimistic... not pessimistic, then a cautious optimist. Why the worry about the year just closed? The optimistic outlook he had earlier said for the summer and into the fall, receipts reaching expected levels for the budget year ending June 30, but voted a note of caution about the general fund collections... Revenue Commissioner James E. Lockett said Finance Commissioner Albert Christian had just released final collection figures for the last fiscal year when Frankfort was making his statement on fiscal 1969-70. Lockett said preliminary figures indicate the \$57 million general fund estimate... Why the worry about the year just closed? Forgy said spending would be trimmed in order to conform with the level of income. Forgy is not concerned deeply that it will cause a serious problem because we'll spread it over the entire year and not just a portion... Gov. Louie B. Nunn got this done since he went into office in late December and had to re-

duce spending to make up for the \$24 million shortage that developed in the income picture. NOTICE To All Dog Owners

(1) Kentucky State Dog Law requires ALL dogs six months old and older to have a state dog license. All dog tags are now on sale as of July 1, 1970, and all unlicensed dogs are in violation of the law. A fine of not less than \$5.00 and coat. (2) Any livestock owner must LICENSE all dogs owned or harbored in order to be recompensed for any livestock losses that occur. Any person who owns or harbors an unlicensed dog shall forfeit any right to be REIMBURSED OUT OF THE LIVESTOCK FUND for any damage to his livestock or poultry by dogs. (3) If any farmer that is complying with the Kentucky State Dog Law Program should have a livestock loss he is to contact the COUNTY DOG WARDEN within 24 hours of the loss and an affidavit of the loss so that he can be compensated by the STATE LIVESTOCK FUND. (4) Dog tags may be purchased at the COUNTY COURT HOUSE, SHERIFF'S OFFICE, or from the COUNTY DOG WARDEN. All tags are \$1.50 each, except kennel licenses.
