### APES Merit

#### Youth Scholars

Four local youth scholars from Nicholas County High School, have been awarded all-expense-paid trip scholarships to the University of Kentucky Youth Seminar on the dates of June 22, 23, and 24. Their awards are for their outstanding work in studying "The American Private Enterprise System," using materials and procedures which were developed by the University.

Named to participate in the Kentucky Youth Seminar, which is sponsored by the University of Kentucky and the Kentucky Cooperative Council, are: Carolyn Tolson, Larry Trussell, Judy Bellamy and Barbara Caswell. Alternates selected were David Wilson, Brenda Gray and Vicky Bruner.

Sara Swango, local Extension agent in 4-H, will accompany the group to Lexington and also participate as one of the adult counselors for the Seminar.

These selected local youth scholars, along with eleven others, have been participating in their study program over a period of eight weeks, in which, with the help of several adult leaders and resource people, they have made a comprehensive study of the economic system of the United States and the types of business comprising it. One of their individual and group study efforts have come as increased understanding and appreciation of the American private enterprise system, and some new awareness of career opportunities.

At the June Seminar, the youth scholars will take part in further study of business and economics, both in general sessions and in small discussion and problem-solving groups, under the guidance of U. K. professors and other experts. As many as 175 outstanding youth scholars are expected for the June Seminar, along with 35 or more adult counselors. These will represent the top scholars from several hundred more who have been involved similarly to the local group in study programs over the past several weeks and months.

At the conclusion of the 3-day Kentucky Youth Seminar, 14 youth scholars and 2 junior leaders will be awarded, on the basis of their measured performance during the 14-day, all-expense-paid trip scholarships to Ohio State University in August to attend the summer meeting of the American Institute of Cooperation. Approximately 1,000 local youth scholars from all over the United States will participate in this national 4-day meeting. The dates are Aug. 2-5. There, all youth scholars will be administered a national agriculture exam.

All exams will be computer scored, and the standings will be announced before the youth scholars leave Columbus, Ohio on Aug. 5. In 1969 at the University of Illinois the small Kentucky group placed 3 youth scholars in the top eight in the nation, in competition with more than 900 youth scholars from all over the United States. These were Annie Blue from Madisonville; Billy Glover, from Wilmore; and Leon Thomas, from Lebanon.
