Changes in ASC Elections Noted

For the 1970 elections of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) community committees, changes have been made to strengthen both responsibility and responsiveness on the local level, Harvey Wagener, Chairman of the Nicholas County ASC Committee, reported recently.

"ASC committees make many decisions particularly vital to individual local producers. The new election procedures for community committees will help assure that these farmer-elected committees are fully representative of the farmers in their communities," he said.

ASC community committees elect the ASC county committee. The county committee in each agricultural county is responsible locally for administration of farm programs which include pre-support loans and payments, crop allotments and allocations, and agricultural conservation and anti-pollution programs. In addition to electing the county committee, ASC community committees assist in administering these farm programs.

One election change is that nominations for ASC community committees will first be by petition, then the incumbent community committee will name additional candidates. Until this year, Mr. Wagener said, the community

committees usually nominated a full slate as well as accepting nominating petitions.

Provision has been made to insure minority group representation in cases where the incumbent community committee fills out the slate. If no minority group members have been nominated by valid petition in a community where eight percent or more of those eligible to vote are minority members, then at least one minority group member shall be among the candidates added to the community slate by the incumbent community committee.

Mr. Wagener pointed out that in no case can the committee add to the slate if six or more valid nominations by petition are received during the petition period, which is July 28 through August 17. The election will be held (by mail) in September. New committee members will take office Oct. 1.

Signatures of six eligible voters are required for nomination, and voters may sign as many petitions as they wish. Eligible voters are farmers who are eligible to participate in any program administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. This includes farm owners, tenants, or sharecroppers.

Another change in election procedure is that voters this year will vote for three or fewer candi-

dates instead of five or fewer as in prior years. Mr. Wagener reported. Community committees will continue to have a membership of three, with two alternates.

State Road Aid to County Up

FRANKFORT—Annual State aid for Nicholas County's roads has increased more than \$18,000 during the past two years, Governor Louis B. Nunn announced recently.

This is an increase of 20.6 percent from the 1967-68 fiscal year to the 1969-70 fiscal year.

Nicholas County's Rural Secondary program went from \$19,675 in the 1967-68 fiscal year to \$131,902 the next fiscal year and to \$139,940 this fiscal year. This represents a 17 percent increase in funds available for rural road work.

Combs Formally Announces For Governor

LOUISVILLE, June 13—Bert T. Combs formally announced his campaign for the Democratic nomination for Governor of Kentucky, Saturday, June 13, at a press conference at the Kentucky Hotel, Louisville, before a crowd of more than 3500, which filled all available standing room in the Flag Room and all outer lobby space.

In explaining why he chose to run for governor instead of a federal judgeship, Combs stated "...one of the legitimate complaints of our young people is that too many of my generation have become so concerned with material possessions that we are unwilling to make personal sacrifices involved in public service. I was not content to sit in comfortable isolation for the past 12 years, removed from the trials of my state. In times like these all of us have an obligation to make our services available."

Sharing the platform with Combs was Julian Carroll, Paducah, Attorney, and Speaker of the House of Representatives, who is running for Lieutenant Governor on the Combs ticket.

Following his official announcement, Combs introduced his State Chairman, Robert Matthews, Shelbyville, a member of the Law Firm of Greenbaum, Graison, Doolittle, Matthews & Boone, Louisville, and former Attorney General of Kentucky.
