Kay's Kitchen

Back to the salads which I started two weeks ago. Just had to get those fish recipes while fishing was good at the lake.

POTATO FRANK SALAD
4 medium size potatoes peeled and diced
4 medium size carrots parred and sliced 1/4 inch thick
1 1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
1 large onion chopped
8 frankfurters sliced 1/4 inch thick
2 tablespoons margarine
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons vinegar
2 tablespoons water
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon sweet pickle relish
1/2 cup carrots, celery and onion until tender. Salt, Drain and pat to salad bowl. Stir frank in margarine and parsley. 2 green onions, stir in sugar, salt, pepper, vinegar and water; beat to boiling; pour over vegetables. Toss lightly to mix and let stand 15 to 30 minutes to season. Mix pickle relish with mayonnaise and four food processors, mix well. Add to salad to add more mayonnaise. The important thing is to have salad moist enough, so use your own judgement. This should serve six and is almost a meal in itself.

ASPARAGUS SALAD
For Asparagus Salad use all green or white canned asparagus, drained, 2 or 3 spears on lettuce. Use a strip or two of pineapple for color and add hard boiled eggs. Serve with desired dressing.

SARDINE SUMMER SALAD
Mix 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce, add 1/4 cup sliced, chopped olives and parsley, 2 green onions, chopped, 1 cucumber, peeled and sliced, 2 tomatoes, peeled and cut in 1/2 wedges. Serve on bed of lettuce topped with hard boiled eggs sliced and as desired cut into bite size pieces.

TUNA-MACARONI SALAD
Cook one 16 ounce package shell macaroni according to directions until tender. Drain and cool. Add 2-4 1/2 oz. or 7 ounce cans of flaked, 1 1/2 cups diced celery, 2 green onions, sliced, 1/2 cup mayonnaise with 1/4 cup lemon juice (if you use 1 1/2 cups salad dressing omit lemon juice), 1/2 cup milk, 3/4 teaspoon each of Worcestershire salt and pepper, 1/2 cup chopped pineapple or sweet and pickled relish. Add to tuna-macaroni mixture. Chill and serve on lettuce. Should serve eight.
