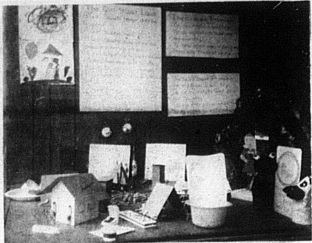


### The How And Why of Wildflower Names

In a few short weeks from now, wildflowers by the hundreds will start blooming throughout the fields and woodlands of Kentucky. Many will go out to observe their beauty and to delight in their fragrance, and some may wonder about their names, who named them, and why.

Many people, botanists, romantics, and just plain country folk alike, have had a hand in naming wildflowers, and for various reasons. Mainly, however, certain names for certain plants result from their appearance and physical attributes. This, of course, applies more to the common than

to the scientific names. The trout lily, for instance, was so named because its speckled leaves bear a faint resemblance to the flukes of a trout. Then there's the turk's cap lily which got its name because of the way its brilliant orange petals, spotted with purplish brown, curl in the peculiar imitation of the turban of a Turk.

Lady's slipper, one of our most beautiful wild orchids, was imaginatively named because of its resemblance to the dainty moccasins or slippers worn by Victorian ladies in their boudoirs. Roots of plants also have their place in nomenclature. Well-named is bloodroot, yellow root, lake root, ginseng, and others possessing descriptive characteristics. When brant, bloodroot exudes a reddish juice not unlike blood flowing from a cut finger.

Love of wildflowers and beautiful imagery seems to go together like when an early American clergyman, on his way through the woods to hold a meeting, spotted a Virginia spiderwort growing by the wayside. Noting that soon after opening, its purplish petals turned into droplets of a glistening substance, he called it "Job's tears"—the common name that remains today.

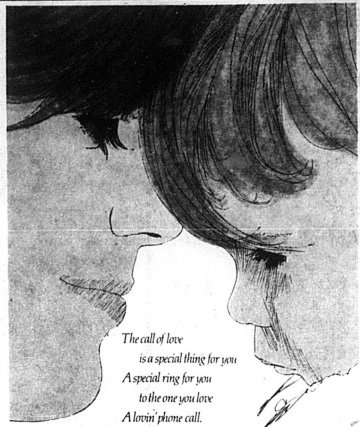
Many have wondered why the dainty white meadow wildflower, blazing star, acquired such a name as "devil's bit." According to legend, roots of this plant will

cure almost any ailment from chills and fever to dropsy, and thus was eagerly sought by early herbalists. In wet, poorly-drained soil the sprout of this plant often rots away. Observing this, these old naturepoets claimed that, for mankind, Old Satan went around biting off its roots, hoping there, too, to cause mankind to suffer.

There are many other delightful, fully descriptive wildflower names like foxglove, touch-me-not, wake robin, windflower, and jack-in-the-pulpit. Foxglove, because it does appear to be a witch, touch-me-not because its seed pod explodes when disturbed, wake robin (trillium) which come with the first of windflowers (anemone) since believed to open only when April winds blow, and jack-in-the-pulpit got its unusual name because the spade looks somewhat like a preacher standing in a

pulpit with a protective green canopy over him.

There are many, many more fascinating wildflower titles, searching out these plants and researching their titling will give added interest and zest to any outdoor pilgrimage. A good book to read along on such a botanical trip is Gray's Botany which will not only help identify the plant, but also will often give the circumstances surrounding its christening, and tell something of the persons who officiated.

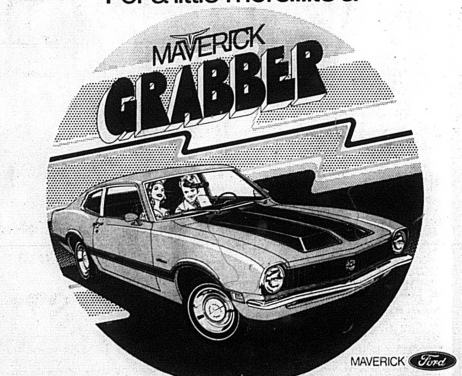

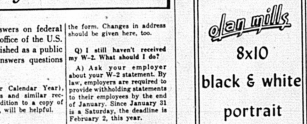
### Hollars Gull Wins Tourney

### U.S. Internal Revenue Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q: If I file for a refund for 1970, does that mean you are required to issue a refund to me?

A: You do not have to file an estimated tax declaration for 1970 unless you meet the requirements as explained in the instructions that come with the estimated tax form.

Q: If I have a refund for 1969 as well as to those that are due to me, am I liable for one because they have not been paid?

A: No, you are not liable for one because they have not been paid. The taxes are identified with the taxpayer's name, address and Social Security number. In any year you file an estimated tax declaration, you are required to file a return for that year as well as to those that are due to you.

Q: If I just want to pay my tax, what return should I file?

A: No, you do not have to file a return for 1969. You may file a return for 1969 if you wish to pay your tax for that year.

Q: If I have a refund for 1969, does that mean you are required to issue a refund to me?

A: You do not have to file an estimated tax declaration for 1970 unless you meet the requirements as explained in the instructions that come with the estimated tax form.
