Send In Your Easter Seal Contribution

The Kentucky Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults provided care and treatment for 741 Kentuckians during 1969, it was announced by Murray State University president, Dr. Harry M. Sparks, state Easter Seal campaign chairman.

Of the total, 4,348 children and

393 adults received treatment and other rehabilitation services financed mainly by contributions made during the annual Easter Seal campaign, he reported.

These contributions made possible physical and occupational therapies, hospitalization, residential camping, hearing and speech programs, special education, and other services for victims of handicapping conditions, Sparks added.

Facilities owned and operated by the Kentucky Easter Seal Society are the Hearing and Speech Center, Louisville; Cardinal Hill Hospital and Nursery School, Lexington; West Kentucky Easter Seal Center, Paducah; Northern Kentucky Easter Seal Center, Covington; and Camp Kyes, Carrollton. County committees of the society in various areas provided other services for 400 children, including transportation to and from clinics, and the purchase of braces,

Co-Op Manager Resigns At Fleming RECC

Flemingsburg (Special)—Peter T. McNeil, 43, an employee of Fleming-Mason Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation since 1959, has resigned to accept the position of manager of Blue Grass Rural Electric Cooperative, Nicholasville. He will begin his new duties March 16.

A native of West Jefferson, N.C., Mr. McNeil is a graduate of West Jefferson High School, received his degree from Berea College and did graduate work at Cornell University. He also completed the NRECA Management Training Course.

He purchased a farm in Fleming County in 1953 and two years later was appointed Assistant County Agent. The following year he became County Agent, serving until 1959.

In 1959, he was named Power Use Advisor for Fleming-Mason RECC and helped develop the Member Services Department, and became its first Member Services Director in 1961. In 1964, he was granted a six month leave to serve as Rural Economist with a National power Survey Team in Korea. Upon his return, Mr. McNeil continued to serve as Member Services Director and later as Staff Assistant for the Co-op.

In 1967, he was granted a two year leave of absence to accept a position as Advisor with the Co-operative League of the USA and he and his family spent those years in Bangkok, Thailand.

Since returning July 1, Mr. McNeil has been on special assignment as Director of Area and Industrial Development, setting up a program which will now be handled by the Member Services Staff.

Blue Grass RECC was established in 1937 and serves six Central Kentucky counties. It has a membership of over 4,600.

Mr. McNeil is a veteran of World War II having served as Coxswain with the United States Navy.
