SPEAKERS FOR STATE HOMEMAKERS' MEET

Featured speakers at the Mar. 19-20 annual meeting of the Kentucky Extension Homemakers Association include a nationally-known lecturer and researcher on young people and their values and the program leader of the Federal Extension Service's Division of Home Economics.

Scheduled for shorter talks on the program are Kentucky's First Lady, a Louisville television personality, and five University of Kentucky administrators.

Dr. Walter L. Thomas will discuss "Values and American Youth" at the Friday morning, Mar. 20, session. Currently director of the Project on Student Values in Grand Rapids, Mich., conducting educational research and curriculum development in value education, Dr. Thomas has also directed and reported a four-year study of student values involving a number of U.S. colleges.

In addition, he has published three psychological tests dealing with personal values and self-concepts for age groups ranging from three years to adults as well as various professional papers concerning value education. He has served as a professor of psychology and education at several colleges in Oklahoma, Michigan and Illinois, and also is regarded as a specialist in the evaluation of schools and colleges and the direction of institutional studies. He has directed five comprehensive institutional self-studies of colleges in the North Central Association and has been a consultant for ten other such studies. He also has directed two church-

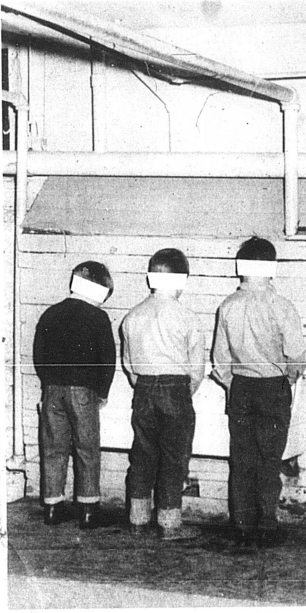

HEALTH Dept. Comments On Condition In Schools

"Health conditions in the Nicholas County elementary schools are very inadequate," as stated by the County Health Inspector. A recent survey taken by the Kentucky State Department of Health revealed that all three elementary schools were very substandard and presented many health and safety problems.

With the increase in enrollment each year these problems can only worsen. It was stated that from a health standpoint, even if the school tax is passed, extensive work will be labeled urgent, until the new building is completed.

Below are listed various items in each of the three elementary schools that contribute to poor health conditions, according to the County Health Inspector.

The Carlisle Elementary school has a health rating of 47. The ratings are based on a possible 100. There are 535 students enrolled at the school and according to the State Health Department, the present toilet facilities are adequate for an enrollment of only 100 students. The building is in a bad state of repair; poor ventilation; over-crowded rooms; inadequate lighting; over loaded wiring and definite fire hazards with only one exit to some rooms.

Nicholas County Elementary has a rating of 34. Lacking a portion of the existing problems; Sewage overflow onto surface of grounds; private water supply not protected from contamination and time supply not adequate; heating system not sufficient in very cold weather; building in need of immediate repair.

Moorefield Elementary, rating 65. Fire hazards rate high in this school; lunch room facilities not adequate with existing equipment; building in need of repairs; screens badly needed; inadequate lighting.

1970 Head Start Plans Announced

Applications will be taken for teachers, volunteer aides, and other personnel. The paid aides are to be parents of Head Start children if possible. All paid aides must be 17 years of age or older. Teacher's qualifications are to be as close to preschool requirements as possible.

Applicants may apply to the Nicholas County Board of Education.

35,218 Flu Cases Reported in State
