## Burley Support Chemical Usage Tied Together

Tobacco producers must certify that they have not used pesticides containing DDT and TDE on their 1970 crop tobacco plants in order to be eligible for price supports on the product this year, Harvey Waggoner, Chairman of the Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, announced.

Grows were urged by Mr. Waggoner to use alternate materials which are available and have been demonstrated to be effective in controlling plant pests.

U.S. exports of tobacco face sharp reduction if DDT and TDE use continues, Mr. Waggoner explained. Approximately 35 percent of all U.S. grown tobacco is exported, and several foreign countries that are now large importers of our tobacco have indicated that they will set very narrow DDT and TDE tolerances on cured leaf. These restrictions are scheduled to become effective in January 1973.

It is essential for growers to meet these standards now, Mr. Waggoner said, because most of the 1970 crop that moves under loan will not likely be sold and exported prior to 1973. This is because tobacco is usually stored for one year for extended periods before being used, Mr. Waggoner explained.

## 20 Merit Students Participate In APES Program Underway

It Pays to Know the American Private Enterprise System! 20 Nicholas County Merit Youth scholars have accepted this challenge by participating in a unique program which involves a comprehensive study and understanding of the American economy.

Local business and professional representatives will serve as discussion leaders during the series of eight meetings to be held at the First National Bank. Topics to be covered include essentials of successful business, partnership and individually owned businesses, the corporation and the cooperative.

The key leaders involved are Jack Conley, city attorney; Charles Cox, county attorney; Charles Watkins, vice-president of First National Bank; David Zachary, Hopkins' Drug Pharmacist; Paul Garrett, Garrett's Furniture; Wayne Shimata, manager of Blue Grass Industries; Darrell Scriber and Frank Vaughn, manager and assistant manager of Southern States Cooperative.

What are the rewards for these students? They will learn about the private enterprise system, explore career opportunities and exercise leadership in their group. Four Nicholas County students will be selected on a merit basis to attend all-expense paid to the Kentucky Youth Seminar held at the University of Kentucky in June. 14 scholars will be selected at the seminar to attend the National Institute of Cooperation to be held in Aug. at Ohio State. And, they could win one of seven college scholarships to be awarded as a result of their participation in this program.

The organizational meeting of the APES group was held on March 10, during which the students received their program materials and selected officers. Officers serving this youth action group are as follows: president, Vicky Bruner; vice-president, Phyllis Atkinson; secretary, Barbara Caswell; treasurer, Brenda Goy; and reporter, Judy Bellamy. Kenneth C. Dinkley, from the University of Kentucky Agriculture Economics Dept. and state coordinator of the project, gave a narrated film presentation on the local, state and national programs.

The Nicholas County APES students are planning to tour local industries during February Aggregation Week and the Merrill Lynch, Pierce, and Smith, stock brokerage firm in Lexington.

This program is sponsored by the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service and the Kentucky Cooperative Council.

## Fire At Nicholas Elementary School

A fire alarm for Nicholas County Volunteer firemen which sounded shortly after the noon hour Monday, approximately 12:05 p.m., according to Frankie Hughes, found Hughes with the firetruck and no volunteers. Hughes called the city building requesting that another alarm be sounded.

The blaze which was quickly extinguished upon the arrival of the fire truck at the Headquarters school (Nicholas County Elementary) may have been caused by a carelessly tossed cigarette or match. There was no damage.

An unidentified student who proclaimed to a teacher that he had smelt smoke in the room closest to Carlisle or that side of the building next to the Headquarters hill, proved to be right and the alarm was then turned in.

Hughes stated the blaze was underneath the room in an area that had once had an iron grating to allow ventilation under the building, but that the grating had at some time been replaced with a loose concrete block and the space between the floor joists and the earth was "now used as a trash disposal spot."

The County Volunteers went to the area down thoroughly. According to Hughes another five or ten minutes but in reporting the blaze could have resulted in severe damage to that end of the building.

## Martha Cohn 4-H Club '70 Champion

Miss Martha Cohn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Cohn, has been selected as a State 4-H Club Champion for 1970.

Her winning category, Bread, was one of 30 4-H projects and activities in which winners were announced this week by Miss Helen Horton, UK extension program specialist in 4-H youth development.

State 4-H champions are chosen from area champions who, in turn, have been selected from county winners, who pointed out. Selections in each project are based mainly on the work and accomplishments in that particular project and on what the project work has done for the boy or girl. Work in other 4-H projects and activities, evidence of leadership ability, and participation in community and school activities also are considered.

All 4-H members submit written reports and narrative stories of projects and activities they have completed during the year, as well as a summary of 4-H work done in previous years. From these records, winners are chosen. Records of area champions are judged for state honors by a special committee made up of area Extension agents and Extension subject matter specialists.

Miss Horton noted that final selections of 1970 National 4-H Congress delegates and winners of other out-of-state trips have not yet been made.
