The children were tested in two ways. In one, they filled out a "Moral Judgment Inventory," where the child is given 10 "moral dilemmas" and asked what he would do in each situation. In the other test, the child is presented with two tasks that could be successfully completed only by cheating.

In one, the children knew that if they score 21 or more they would get a prize. The game was set up so that a score of 25 was just barely "fail" and a score of 30 was "passable." However, they were told to record their own score and the experimenter was purposely watching them. The teachers were told that where they'd separate the sugar and spice from the snaks and puppy dog tails.
