Task Force Being Formed For Solid Waste Disposal In Kentucky Region XV

A Task Force is being formed in Kentucky Region XV to bring to the attention of the people the solid waste disposal problems of the Bluegrass region. Working together, the Kentucky Development Committee, State Health Department, representatives of Spindletop Research, Farmers Home Administration, the University of Kentucky and the Bluegrass Regional Health Planning Council will assist the county and city governments in developing an effective solid waste disposal system. The goals of the Task Force are to properly dispose of solid waste material, the beauty of the Bluegrass Region and at the same time, properly dispose of solid waste material. The group will involve a cross-section of leaders and officials in the development of an Area Solid Waste Planning Committee to advise the Federal Government to the communities of this region. It is visualized this program will produce an effective solid waste disposal system within the financial capability of the communities and at the same time, provide the maximum protection to the environment and the health of the community.

One Payment Leads To Errors

Louisville, Ky.--Anyone planning to pay two Federal taxes at the same time should use separate checks or money orders to avoid possible billing errors, Robert J. Dah, District Director of Internal Revenue for Kentucky said today.

Under the IRS system, which has a different processing cycle for each type of return, the entire payment could be credited to one tax and a bill issued for the other, Mr. Dah said. "If one check or money order covers a 1970 estimated tax payment and a 1969 tax balance due, for example, when the returns are separated for processing, the entire payment might be credited to one tax, leaving the other tax unpaid." In such a situation, one tax would be overpaid and a refund issued, while on the other tax a bill would be sent, Mr. Dah explained.

Taxpayers should put their Social Security number on all checks or money orders sent to IRS, to make sure the payment is properly credited.

Council Appoints Gayle Vanlandingham To Replace Brooks Henson Until July 1

Council appointed Gayle Vanlandingham until July 1 as City General Superintendent at the regular meeting Tuesday night to replace Brooks Henson, who quit on April 30. The position will be filled permanently in July. John Tipp was hired to read meters and assist Vanlandingham at a salary of \$350 per month.

The City agreed to run a sewer line to Arnold Heights after residents sign contracts to come into the City without protest when the City is ready, and adding \$100 hook-up fee is collected per household.

Legion Elects New Officers

Four building permits were passed under protest from Jane Ellen Booth and Eugene Kelley. Both Councilmen argued that all permits should be approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission before being sent to Council. The four were: C-2, Colby Bob Fisher to repair curb, guttering, wall, and steps on the side and the front sidewalk; Lerman Bros. to put in new sidewalk; Annie Brannon to make apartments at 108 Locust Street; Bob Anderson to build a carport.

Another permit which had previously been approved by the Zoning Commission was passed unanimously. It was to build a C-2 Supermarket on Market and Spring Streets.

Henry Peters, Manager at Blue Grass Knitting appeared before Council to discuss a \$274.45 penalty added to BCK's water bill for payment delinquency. He stated the accounting system in Wisconsin made it almost impossible to pay the water bill within 10 days. Council agreed that the practice of

mailing BCK's (and several other customers) bills several days earlier than the rest would be continued to help the situation. However, the penalty must stand in order to be fair to all other customers who must pay penalties after ten days.

The old Police Station will be moved to the City Barn as a result of a site-breaking vote by Mayor Power (4-3). It will be used for office space and storage.

Vanlandingham was given authority to hire additional help when needed during the summer months. Council voted to purchase a sign and six folding chairs for the Police Station. It was to buy the Police Cruiser, and some paint for the streets.
