Grand Jury Of May Term Returns Four Indictments

Wieman Awarded R.O.T.C. College Scholarship



George H. Wieman, a senior at Staunton Military Academy, Staunton, Vir., has been notified by the commanding general of the Continental Army Command at Fort Moore, Va., that he is one of eight S.M.S. cadets to be awarded four-year R.O.T.C. college scholarships to start this fall.

Cadet Wieman was only a principal candidate for a four-year Navy R.O.T.C. scholarship but has also qualified for a four-year Army R.O.T.C. scholarship which will pay all tuition costs, books, and lab fees providing he attends a college where the R.O.T.C. program is offered and he enrolls in the program. He is paid \$50 per month during the scholarship period.

Cadet Wieman attended Sayre Undergarden, Arlington School, St. Peter School, and Morton Junior High in the Lexington area before enrolling at Staunton Military Academy his sophomore year where he has been recognized for his scholastic achievement by being tapped for membership in the Alexander M. Patch Honor Society, granting the Headmaster and Superintendent's ribbons for scholastic achievement, serving for two years as manager of the swim team, participating in intramural baseball and rifle team activities, baritone player in the brigade band and serving as guidance bearer his senior year; on the circulation staff of the Kollegian, the school newspaper; a member of the Cotillion Club and the Science Club.

Wieman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Quentin Wieman (the former Louise Swinford) 1029 North Broadway, Lexington, is the grandson of Mrs. U.M. Swinford, Carlisle, has been accepted at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio.

Cadet Wieman will be graduated from Staunton Military Academy on Sunday, May 31, 1970.

The Grand Jury of the May 1970 term of the Nicholas Circuit Court reports the following after being in session two days. They returned four indictments. However, they did not return indictments on two charges referred to them for investigation.

The Grand Jury make the following recommendations:

That the Nicholas County Fiscal Court repair or replace the steps that lead from Main Street into the Courthouse Yard at the Main entrance on Main Street.

That the Nicholas County Fiscal Court repair whatever plastering that needs to be done in the men's quarters in the jail and paint it after the plastering is done. This Grand Jury recommended the construction of the entrance into the Jail off of Elm Street so as to avoid taking prisoners through the living quarters at the jail.

The Grand Jury visited the John-Mathers Nursing Home and the Nicholas County Hospital and observed the great differences in the space arrangements under which the personnel at these two institutions must operate. The County Attorney indicated that preliminary planning was in process for possible expansion at the hospital and in any such expansion the Grand Jury would urge the persons responsible to make sure that the kitchen is rearranged in such a way that it would be more convenient for the people who have to take care of it, both as to cooking and food storage. The Grand Jury also noticed the crowded waiting room; the offices and record storage area and also the possible need for expanded parking facilities.

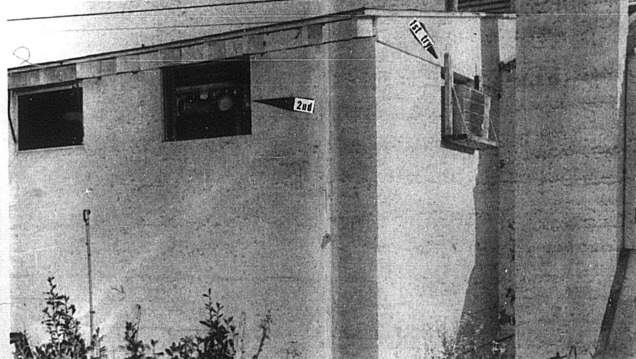
