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Council Meets Monday Night

City Council voted Monday night at its regular meeting to offer Jerry Wasson \$1,000 per foot for right-of-way across his property so that the sewer line could be completed to the Housing Project.

The right-of-way, the last one required, was obtained by Tuesday morning by the City Attorney, Jack Conley, and the sewer line is under construction again by the City.

Construction of another Housing Project was discussed by a representative of the government and Council. Slides were shown of other Kentucky projects and the representative stated that the city would be required to set up a 4 member committee. A motion to do this was passed 4-2.

The Supply Committee was authorized to purchase an air-conditioner for the City Building. Council agreed to purchase gold lettering for the two corner windows of the City Building and some stick-on letters for the office door.

Council will solicit the help of the Cynthiana Auxiliary Police during the Blackberry Festival; half of the cost to be paid by the American Legion.

Building permits were granted to A.D. and Doris Payne and Mrs. John Clinebarr.

The meeting was adjourned until the next regular meeting which will be held on June 8.

The Carlisle girls finished fourth in the meet ahead of Nicholas County and Morgan County. Coach Carvelton took nine girls from the fifth through the eighth grades. These girls won medals: 50 Yard Dash—4th place, Mary Coburn; Discus Throw—1st place, Rachel Booth, 77-7; Heaveus Throw—2nd place, Kathy Austin; Long Jump—3rd place, Mary Coburn; Shot Put—3rd place, Rachel Booth.

County Road Aid Program Stated

Highway Commissioner Eugene Gos has announced a 1970-71 County Road Program of \$62,132 for Nicholas County.

Included in the program are 71 maintenance projects providing for bituminous and rock surfacing of 133.2 miles of country roads and one improvement project.

Receiving seal-bituminous surfacing will be Garrett Road beginning at KY 1244 West and extending to the Harrison County line.

County Road Aid funds are provided by a \$13 million appropriation of the General Assembly for county road maintenance and improvements.

Mrs. Kingsolver Attends Conference
