 FRANK FORT—The shape of things to come in next May's primary for state officers is beginning to emerge with more clarity than smoke clears from this year's congressional elections.
 The clearest thing emerging is that Gov. Louis B. Nunn's Republican administration will be opposed by Gov. Emory S. Johnson of the Democratic Party. Nunn has indicated that he will be happy to support 83-year-old Tom Emberger of Meigs County, who resigned recently from the Public Service Commission. Another potential candidate for governor is Robert Cable, 56-year-old former Parks Commissioner.
