## Burley Demand Brisk; '73.41 Mt. Sterling Average

The demand for Burley was brisk on the opening day Monday, Nov. 23. Mt. Sterling led the four town areas that most Nicholas Counties sell in with an average of \$73.41; Lexington was next with \$73.35; Paris had \$73, and Cynthiana, \$71.69.

The statewide average was \$72.78 based on the sale of 26,612.94 pounds for \$17,914,315.18 vs. last year's opening day average of \$71.75.

The seven-market Blue Grass Burley Belt had an opening day average of \$72.06.

## IMPORTANT Selective Service Registrants

The local Selective Service Board has been instructed to promptly reopen and consider for reclassification any registrant who requests, in writing, that his current deferment be cancelled.

"Our instructions are that a young man wishing to drop his deferment should be permitted to do so at any time regardless of whether he continues to meet the conditions for which his deferment was granted," said Miss Hallye Griffin, Secretary of Local Board No. 77.

"The uncertainty and anxieties that young men of this county who hold high numbers in the 1969 'draft lottery' (1944 through 1950) to their vulnerability to the 'draft' have lessened by new instructions.

Should a young man hold a number higher than that reached by his local board it is to his advantage to voluntarily give up his deferment for a I-A classification. It now appears that 170 will be the highest number reached by Local Board No. 77 in 1970.

Any man who is currently classified in one of the following classes I-S, H-A, H-C, H-S whose random sequence number has not been reached during 1970 by his local board, is eligible to drop his deferment.

The written request for withdrawal of deferment must be made immediately in order that the local board can promptly reopen and consider for reclassification.

A young man who voluntarily gives up his deferment for a I-A

classification will join other members of the 1970 first priority group with unrecalled numbers in 1971. These new instructions do not apply to men born in 1951.
