

WHAT IS A FOX???

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A bare list of the foods a fox eats, even when it includes the quantity of each item, may be misleading unless supplemented with a lot of other information. For instance, a fox's diet is not the same throughout the year. In winter, the fox's diet is mostly made up of mammals. In summer and early fall, many game animals are available. The whole animal world seems to go through what is known as a "fall shuffle." And this, too, is the time when young foxes leave home to make their own way in the world.

The Grand Jury suggests considering the growing population that this school building be kept in the best repair possible for future use.

NICHOLAS COUNTY HIGH: Well kept with the exception of several minor details such as water blowing through vents into new cafeteria thus staining walls, doors at front of building need replacement or paint, electrical panel in commodities room left uncovered. The school building unauthorized personnel came in contact with same. Crack in concrete on west side should be repaired before cold weather.

The Grand Jury recommends that the Courthouse and Jail be repaired or replaced, if possible, or completely replaced with new concrete wherever needed. The front steps and the sidewalk leading from the west door way to Locust Street, in the opinion of the Grand Jury should be completely reconstructed. After this is completed it is further recommended that no heavy trucks be permitted to cross these sidewalks.

The Grand Jury recommends that the Fiscal Court be removed at regular intervals all weeds and poison vey vines that grow around the sidewalk surrounding the courthouse yard either on the inside or outside of the wall. It is suggested that a regular cleanup be established for any litter that is allowed to accumulate throughout the yard.
