ing for Nicholas County, First, let me say that everything possible has been done in the Office of the Superintendent to expedite our new building program. After the bond issue was passed in Nicholas County no time was wasted in the selection of an architect. The Board chose Luckett and Parkey of Louisville. This firm is doing more school work in Kentucky than any other.

Several meetings were held with the Board and architects working out plans for the new building. In our early discussions with the Department of Education, Division of Finance, we were advised to not try to rush our architects if we wanted a good job done for the lowest dollar.

Now that final plans are complete, we think we have on paper one of the finest school buildings anywhere.

Drawings and blueprints are now in the hands of prospective general contractors. They will need some time to study these and prepare their bids. These bids will be received at the Nicholas County Court House Nov. 2, 1970, at 1:00 p.m., E.S.T.

The next step will be to sell the school bonds. Construction will start immediately thereafter. We are told this will be sometime in November of this year.

Fish and Game Fish Supper

The Kennedy Department of Highways with its own forces plans to replace two small wooden bridges in Bourbon County. One of these bridges is located on Millersburg-Cynthiana Road (Ky. 1879) approximately two miles north west of Millersburg. The other bridge is located on the Carlisle-Cynthiana Road (Ky. 32 and 30) approximately one mile southeast of the Harrison County line.

These bridges permit only one-way traffic and have a five-ton load limit. They will be replaced with multi-plate arch pipes which will permit two-way traffic and have a 15-ton load capacity.

Due to the construction work it will be necessary to close the M.C. Road and the C.C. Road located within Bourbon County from Oct. 26 through Oct. 30. The traveling public may use other roads in this area.
