Kay's Kitchen

This week I am indebted to Mrs. Emmett Snapp of Deming, NM, who has answered my plea for help in sending recipes that have been requested, and I am sure, her recipe for Tamales sounds so interesting even if you don't want to make them. However I am going to do as she suggests, get two or three other couples together and make an afternoon of fun experimenting with a Mexican meal. Now I'll have to ask someone to get corn shucks for me.

CHILI CON CARNE (SAUCE AND FILLING)

1 1/2 pounds ground steak, pork or chicken
2 tablespoons bacon dripping or butter
1 cup chili sauce and desired amount of Tabasco or red chili powder, or ground chili peppers
1 teaspoon flour
1 clove garlic (minced)
1 to 2 cups meat stock (can substitute half tomato juice or tomato sauce)
Cover meat with water and simmer until tender. Cut meat in two cubes or chop on low speed electric blender. Heat the fat in a large frying pan and add meat and brown.
Add the flour, stirring constantly and let brown. Remove from heat, cook lightly and add the chili sauce with above mentioned hot seasonings.
Season with salt, oregano and garlic. Add 1 cup meat stock if using chili sauce, and add 2 cups of using ground chili pepper. Cook and stir for about 30 minutes to an hour until sauce is thick.

MASA (CORNMEAL MIXTURE)

6 cups masa or commercially prepared meal
1/2 cups warm water, approximately
2 cups lard or shortening
2 teaspoons salt
corn husks

Add water to the masa. Beat in the lard until creamy. Add salt. Then combine the lard with the masa, mixing well.
Trim and wash cornhusks. Soak in warm water until soft.
Spread each husk with 2 tablespoons masa mixture. Then add 1 tablespoon or more of chili con carne. Fold the sides of the husk toward the center, being careful to seal at a time toward the center. Then fold the bottom up and bring the top down, tying if desired. If more masa is desired, a tablespoon or more may be added over the chili before folding. Use the back of a spoon to smooth the masa to cover the filling. Gather each end of husk and tie with white twine.
Cook on a rack in the cooker. Steam for 45 minutes or pressure for 20 minutes at 15 to 20 pounds. Serve hot with more sauce, making tamales, or stand up alone after removing from husks. Yields 5 to 6 dozen.

CHURCH SUPPER CASSEROLE

Peel and slice as many potatoes as you wish, place in layers in greased casserole, then a layer of sliced onions; next a layer of undrained kraut. Continue in this manner to fill the entire casserole you are using. Top with a layer of sliced bacon. Put lid on casserole. Cook completely with foil. Heat over to 325 and bake for 4 hours.
