The Carlisle-Nicholas County Housing Commission is sponsoring an "Open House" this coming Sunday, Sept. 13, from 3 to 5 p.m., at each of the Sycamore Hill Apartments, located at the north end of Sycamore Hill in Carlisle.

All city and county residents are invited to come. Members of the Commission, sponsored by seven local churches, and Alex Crawford, project manager, will be present to take you through the remaining vacant apartments and answer any questions with regard to the apartment complex.

The Carlisle-Nicholas County Housing Commission is proud of its accomplishment and wishes all residents to see what its efforts have done for the City of Carlisle and county residents in providing modern housing to low income families. 30 apartments, contained within four buildings, have been erected, each containing a fully equipped kitchen with new gas range and refrigerator, complete bathroom, livingroom and one or more bedrooms with roomy closets.

The project was accomplished through the joint efforts of the Housing Commission and the FHA under the Federal Government's Rent Supplement Housing Program. The idea behind this program is to supplement up to 75% of the monthly rents of the tenants for those who qualify in the low income brackets.

## '71 Model Cars Featured By Local, Area Dealers In The Carlisle Mercury

Ford Division's 46 models in six car lines for 1971 range from the all-new Pinto and hot-selling Mustang to the economical new compact re-styled Ford and elegant Thunderbird. And the most completely changed Mustang since this car started it all in 1964 will kindle anew the interest of sporty compact buyers.

'71 stacks up as nothing short of a vintage hardware year in the auto business," says Robert Harper, local dealer. "Our product line-up not only includes a new entry in a new size for us, but exciting changes in Mustang and Ford as well. This significant investment in new design and engineering changes should add real momentum to recent indications of an upturn in auto sales.

"This action in '71 is bound to be in the small car arena," Mr. Harper says, "and our little Pinto is going to be right in the thick of the downstroke. Combined with Maverick in both the two-door and new four-door version, we've got a one-two small car punch that gives us the strongest entry in the industry in this increasingly important market."

Pinto sports the flair and style of its stabilizers, Mustang and Maverick, while targeting in directly on the size and economy characteristics of the leading imported cars it was created to challenge.

The smallest of the domestic sub-compacts is four inches longer, eight inches wider and seven inches lower than the leading import. But Pinto—the car that looks small and feels big—offers considerably more interior room than the leading import along with better comfort, roadability and maneuverability.

Like the imports, Ford stylists have created a design that is expected to remain unchanged, eliminating changes for the sake of change.

"The Pinto we're introducing this year will look essentially like the Pinto we expect to sell in 1975," Harper said.

Pinto will be powered by a standard four-cylinder water-cooled engine with a displacement of 1600 cubic centimeters (97.6 cubic inches) and a horsepower rating of 75. The front-mounted overhead valve engine, built by Ford of Britain, has been proven by years of use over millions of miles in the popular Ford Cortina and Capri cars. This engine has delivered more than 25 miles per gallon in simulated city-suburban driving.

There will be a little Demon in the Dodge compact family for 1971.

Smaller than its 111-inch-wheelbase Dart "big brother," Demon is a semi-fastback coupe built on a 108-inch wheelbase and will be available in two series—a standard two-door and a performance-oriented version, the Demon 340.

"Demon will be a price leader—a value package with particular appeal for younger families, college students, and women who work," said Junior Dunlap.

"The Demon is one of the most pleasing automobiles we have ever brought to market," he pointed out. "The overall appearance is contemporary, which allows the car to fit in almost any given situation.

"Handling, performance, and economy characteristics make Demon at home either on the road or around town. Its compact size simplifies parking, yet offers plenty of room for passengers and luggage.

Demon and 1971 Dart will share front and dash appointments. The rear side windows on the Demon will be the pivot type. Tailgate and backup lights are concealed in vertical slots, which blend with the moulded appearance of the trunk lid.

The standard six-cylinder engine in Demon will be a 194 cubic-inch Slant Six. A 225 cubic-inch Slant Six will be optional. Standard V-8 will be the 316 cubic-inch engine. In the Demon 340, a 340 cubic-inch V-8 is standard.

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The new Vega Hatchback coupe, a distinctive four-passenger coupe model of Chevrolet's new 1970 Vega 2300 economy car, has a wide combination rear window and rear deck that steps up for easy access to the rear compartment and a fold-down rear seat for extra cargo room.
