Theme of State-Wide Essay Contest Is Pollution

"Pollution—It's Effect On My Community" is the theme of the 1970 Conservation Essay Contest, sponsored state-wide by the Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times in cooperation with the Kentucky Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts and the State Department of Education.

The Nicholas SWCD will sponsor the contest locally in cooperation with the Nicholas County Schools.

State winners will receive U.S. Savings Bonds in the amount of \$500 for first place, \$300 for second place and \$100 for third place.

County winners will receive a \$25 U.S. Savings Bond for first place, cash awards of \$10 for second place, \$7 for third, \$5 for fourth, \$3 for fifth, and \$2 for sixth.

First and second place winners in each grade in each school will get \$2 and \$1 respectively.

Reference material will be sent to the schools about the middle of September, according to the sponsor.

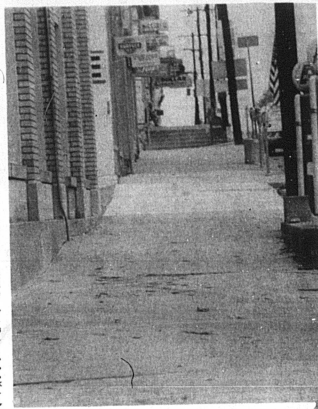

July Bond Sales Total \$3,098

Sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds and Notes in Nicholas County for July were \$3,098 while sales for the year reached \$30,537. The annual goal of \$107,300. Sales a year ago were \$36,110.

Kentucky sales for July were \$411,972 while cumulative sales for the first seven months totaled \$3,240,800 of the annual goal of \$38,300,000.
