Easter Sunrise Service; Holy Week Services Set

The Annual Community Easter Sunrise Service conducted by the Nicholas County Ministerial Association will be held at the First Christian Church, Kennedy Heights, at 6:30 a.m.

Loren A. Broadus Jr. will bring the Easter message. Mr. Broadus is Associate Professor of Ministerial Practice at Lexington Theological Seminary. A native of Providence, Ky. and a graduate of the University of Florida, he received his B.D. from L.T.S. in 1960 and then joined the seminary faculty in 1968.

The Good Friday Services will be at the Carlisle Christian Church, 2 to 3 p.m. The subject, "The Seven sayings of Christ."

VA Sets Mobile Home Standards

The Veterans Administration recently announced standards for its mobile home program which guarantees up to 40 percent of loans—up to a maximum of \$10,000 for mobile homes, or up to \$15,000 if the loan is also for a fully developed lot.

J. G. Ratliff, Director of the VA Regional Office in Louisville, said the mobile home program was established by public law and that it is now in operation. The VA has prescribed regulations to govern such items as mobile home sites, construction standards and written manufacturer's warranties.

Ratliff said there are also qualifications for mobile home park locations, basically the same as those for an average subdivision in which single family homes are built. They must have the same facilities, such as proper geographical locations, water, sewage, electricity, etc. The mobile home purchased under its program must be at least 40 feet long and 10 feet wide, with a minimum of 400 square feet.

Ratliff pointed out the new law empowers the VA Administrator Donald F. Johnson to set interest rates at levels to insure adequate capital for mobile home loans made by lending institutions. He set the interest rate of 10.75 percent on the mobile home. The interest rate for money used to purchase a lot and make improvements was set at 7 percent.

Applicants may obtain their certificates of eligibility from the VA Regional Office in their state of residence. After locating a mobile home they like which meets the VA standards and locating a suitable mobile home lot for rent or purchase, the veteran should then apply to a local private lender for a loan.

Ratliff said veterans and servicemen with at least 181 days of active service after Jan. 31, 1955, are eligible for mobile home loans as are veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict who served more than 90 days, provided they have not previously used their home loan benefits.

Veterans discharged for service-connected disabilities regardless of length of service, widows of eligible veterans, and wives of members of the Armed Forces missing in action or prisoners of war for more than 90 days may also be eligible for home loan benefits.

Ratliff said veterans could secure full information from the VA Regional Office, 600 Federal Place, Louisville, Kentucky 40202.
