**C&MS Controls To Tighten**

ATLANTA, Ga.—The U.S. Consumer and Marketing Service will tighten its meat inspection regulations effective April 9 on beef carcasses that show evidence of tapeworm infection.

The amendment is essentially the same as that proposed by this U.S. Department of Agriculture agency Nov. 7, 1970, when public comments were invited.

C&MS officials said the changes are based on recent studies by the Consumer and Marketing Service and the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Public Health Service.

Copies of the amendment may be obtained from the Insurance and Coordinating Staff, Standards and Inspection Division, Consumer and Marketing Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

The Harrington Amendment provides that the President's authority to induce expiring on June 30, 1971, Ayes 62, Noes 38, Rejected, March 31, 1971, Mr. Watts voted No.

The Whalen Amendment provides that the President's authority to induce expiring on July 1, 1972, Ayes 198, Noes 200, Rejected, March 31, 1971, Mr. Watts voted No.

The Dennis Amendment provides that conscientious objectors continue to serve 2 years in civilian service instead of the proposed 3 years, Ayes 131, Noes 242, Rejected, April 1, 1971, Mr. Watts voted No.

The Frazier Amendment provides that persons inducted after December 31, 1971 cannot be required to serve in Indochina, Ayes 122, Noes 260, Rejected, April 1, 1971, Mr. Watts voted No.

The Gibbons Amendment provides that no persons inducted after June 30, 1971 may be used in combat outside the U.S., unless an attack has occurred or is imminent, or war has been declared or a declaration requested, Ayes 97, Noes 279, Rejected, April 1, 1971, Mr. Watts voted No.

The Carnoy Amendment provides that expiring on December 31, 1972, Ayes 170, Noes 270, Rejected, April 1, 1971, Mr. Watts voted Yes.

Whether to amend the Military Selective Service Act of 1967 (H.R. 6531), extending the draft authority for a period of 2 years, raising military pay, and for other purposes, Years 200, Says 99, Rejected, 2, Passed, April 1, 1971, Mr. Watts voted Yes.
