## 'Military Effectiveness' Curtailed Says National VFW Commander

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars said the congressional bill which would "drastically curtail the nation's military effectiveness."

"Those who might be weighing the pros and cons of military service now have one more reason for not serving. Certainly they may think it is much safer to risk a prison sentence as a draft-dodger than to face the hangerman's noose for obeying military orders."

## BURLEY FARMERS

### May 4 Vote Decides Poundage or No Support

LOUISVILLE, Ky.—U. S. Department of Agriculture officials announced Monday that burley tobacco farmers will vote May 4 whether to accept poundage quota controls or no price support program at all.

The bill limits the pounds of leaf a farmer can grow as opposed to the old program of limiting acreage for burley production. To become effective the poundage program must be approved by two-thirds of the growers in the eight-state burley belt May 4.

The bill establishing the poundage system hasn't been signed by President Nixon yet, but would be effective Friday without his signature unless he vetoes the measure or signs it sooner.

The director of the Kentucky A.S.C., Homer Yonts, said ballots for the referendum now are ready in county offices and that farm poundage quotas already have been computed. These will be mailed to farmers April 21 if the bill is signed, he said.

On the basis of testimony given recently before the Senate Subcommittee on Constitutional Rights, it appears that a wealth of personal information about local people has been stored in the data banks of computers.

According to one witness, Prof. Arthur Miller of the University of Michigan Law School, "Each time a citizen files a tax return, applies for credit or for life in-
