A Burley Tobacco Referendum Rally will be held at the Courthouse in Carlisle, Friday night, April 30, at 8:00 P.M. J. A. B. Hockensmith, Extension Agent for Agriculture in Scott County, will be the speaker.

The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the issues involved in the referendum to be held May 4.

The acreage program has been changed by Congress and you will no longer be able to consider this program. The choice now is a poundage program or no program at all. These are the major changes in the new program:

(1) A shift in production controls by acreage allotments to poundage allotments.

(2) Authorization for the leasing of allotments with certain restrictions.

(3) Limitations on year to year adjustments in allotments that can be made by the Secretary of Agriculture.

(4) Carry forward provisions for over and under marketing of quotas.

(5) Provisions for a referendum by growers to determine if they want the new program or no price supports for the 1971 crop.

All burley growers are urged to attend this meeting. Extension Service, ASCS Committee and the Nicholas County Leadership Committee will take part in the discussions.

Referendum Polling Places Announced

Six referendum polling places have been established in Nicholas County, Harvey Wagener, chairman of the Nicholas County ASC Committee, announced today. Polling places will be mailed from the county ASC office advising farmers as to the polling places where votes are to be cast. The designated polling places have been established to be as convenient as possible to all persons eligible to vote in the Burley Tobacco Referendum on May 4.

The polling places are:

Community A—Headquarters Voting Booth

Community B—Blue Licks Lodge Hall and Myers Voting Booth

Community C—Moorefield Bank

Community D—Nicholas County ASC Office

Community E—Jackson Store A register of eligible voters based on records in the county office has been prepared for each polling precinct, Mr. Wagener said.

Generally a person is eligible to vote in the referendum who shared in the proceeds of a 1970 Burley Tobacco crop in the capacity of owner, cash tenant, share tenant, or sharecropper. If a husband and wife are nonsharecroppers jointly responsible under the sharecropping agreement, both are eligible to vote. A person less than 18 years of age is not eligible to vote.

Mr. Wagener urged all eligible voters to study the issues involved in the forthcoming referendum and to cast a ballot. Polling places will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 6:00 p.m. local time.

Combs Addresses Mt. Sterling Rally

Democratic candidate for the gubernatorial nomination, Bert Combs, spoke at the Mt. Sterling Fish Fry Rally on Friday night.

Addressing an estimated crowd of around 800 persons, several of whom were from Nicholas County, he again pledged "no new taxes, a reduction of existing taxes and natural growth money that can be expected as the economy improves in the next four years."

Julian Carroll, candidate for Lt. Gov. nomination, also spoke at the rally. He related that the former Governor is battling almost 100% in college campus "smuck elections."

The most recent poll of students took place at Henderson Community College where Combs defeated his primary opponent, Lt. Gov. Wendell Ford, 191-96, with some 50% of the student body voting. He commented that this mock election was particularly interesting because it was won in a county right next to Ford's home of Owensboro, and that many of the students are from Owensboro.

Mrs. Combs and Mrs. Carroll also attended the rally. When Mrs. Combs was asked to say a few words she admitted that "although I didn't want my husband to enter this race at first, but since he has, I've gotten my dander up. Her remarks were well received with a grand round of applause.
