Health Department To Hold Dog Clinic

The Nicholas County Department of Health has announced that it will conduct a one day dog clinic for the vaccination of dogs for the dreaded disease of rabies. The Rabies Control Law, which requires all dogs over six months of age to be vaccinated against rabies, makes an owner liable for any person bitten by an unvaccinated dog. If the dog is rabid, the clinic will be held at the Nicholas County Health Center, Saturday, Aug. 7. The hours are from 10 a.m. through 3 p.m. The usual charge of \$1.50 for a three year vaccination will be in effect under the department sponsored clinic. Dr. James Noll will be the attending veterinarian. Free booklets on rabies will be available. Rabies is always a threat to man's environment and an outbreak could occur at any time. Even though the reservoir of rabies lies in our

wildlife, the most effective barrier between the wildlife in the woods and the Kentucky resident is the immunization of household pets. The fact remains that unvaccinated dogs are still the greatest source of danger because they are "members of the household" and constant companions of man. Rabies in vaccinated animals is 100% preventable. Your County Health Department strongly urges every owner to bring their dogs to this clinic. "Your dog protects you, so why not protect him."

Local S.S. Board Secretary Named

Mrs. Dolores Craft has been named the Selective Service System (Supervisory) Executive Secretary for Nicholas County. Mrs. Craft replaces Miss Halvay Griffin who recently retired. Mrs. Craft will be in the local Selective Board Office on Broadway all day on Tuesdays and on Thursday afternoon from 1 to 3 p.m.

The local board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify men, and to order for production physical examinations those young men who may be needed to fill draft calls in the coming month. Mrs. Craft stressed the fact that under the Random Sequence System it is very important a birth certificate be presented at the time of registration. Many young men seem to think that the Selective Service Act has been permanently expired and that they probably will never be drafted. Some of them also think that the

entire system has stopped. They are wrong since it is only the induction authority that has expired. They, therefore, may be unintentionally breaking the law by failing to register at age 18, by not keeping their local boards informed of their current address, or by failing to report, if ordered, for their preinduction physical examinations.

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All City Employees Required for One Year, Salaries Hiked

All city employees were rehired for one year effective July 1, by action of City Council at its regular meeting Monday night. Each employee was given a \$10 per month increase in salary unless he has already reached the maximum pay for his position. Hourly employees were raised 2 cents per hour. Ronald McDonald was hired at the base pay for a patrolman effective July 15. The base pay is \$1.60 per hour. City Attorney Jack Conley brought to Council's attention that the June 21, 1965 Ky.
