CONGRESS VOTES

"Congress Votes" an impartial newsmagazine is in session. It will cover all votes on record and reports the position taken on each measure by the Congressman John C. Watts, Sixth District Representative.

Week ending Thursday, July 29, 1971
Whether to agree to the conference report on H.R. 9270 appropriating \$13.3 billion for fiscal 1972 to the Dept. of Agriculture, Environmental Protection Agency, and other agencies. Yeas 246, Nays 141, Motion Tabled, July 27. Mr. Watts voted yea.

Whether to table a motion instructing House Conference to agree to a Senate Amendment to H.R. 9272. The Senate Amendment prohibits the subversive activities Control Board from exercising certain additional functions. (A yea vote was a vote against the amendment.) Yeas 246, Nays 141, Motion Tabled, July 27. Mr. Watts voted yea.

H.R. 10661 appropriates \$20.4 billion for fiscal 1972 to the Health, Education, and Welfare, and Labor Departments. During debate there were three record teller votes on proposed Amendments.

The Conte-Yates Amendment increasing by \$20 million the H.E.W. appropriation for Health Programs. Ayes 169, Nays 215, Rejected, July 27. Mr. Watts voted aye.

The Glaino Amendments increasing by \$62 million appropriations for Vocational Rehabilitation programs. Ayes 236, Nays 153, Agreed to, July 27. Mr. Watts voted no.

The Burke Amendment increasing by \$46 million the appropriation for services to children in state institutions. Ayes 185, Nays 201, Rejected, July 27. Mr. Watts voted aye.

Whether to pass H.R. 10061, as amended. Yeas 372, Nays 25, Passed, July 27. Mr. Watts voted yea.

During Debate on H.R. 9092, which revises the system for fixing the rates of pay for "prevailing rate" employees, there was one record teller vote on a proposed amendment.

The gross amendment excludes certain classes of employees from the provisions of the bill. Ayes 147, Nays 232. Amendment rejected, July 28. Mr. Watts voted no.

H.R. 9092 was passed later by a recorded vote.

Whether to extend the public works and Economic Development Act and the Appalachian Regional Development Act. Yeas 378, Nays 27, Passed, July 28. Mr. Watts voted yea.

Whether to agree to the conference report on H.R. 9382 appropriating \$18.7 billion for fiscal 1972 to the Dept. of Housing and Urban Development and on other agencies. Yeas 362, Nays 30, Present 1. Agreed to, July 29. Mr. Watts voted yea.

Whether to concur in an amendment (in lieu of Senate Amendment No. 5) to H.R. 9667 providing \$28.5 million for payment of all-lease expenses toward development of the Supercoke Aircraft. Yeas 307, Nays 98, Ties 1. Motion to concur agreed to, July 29. Mr. Watts voted yea.

Lease and Transfer Available To Growers

Burley tobacco growers are being reminded that farm marketing quotas may now be leased and transferred to other farms. This new provision will enable growers to lease production and lease their farm quotas, according to Paul L. Fuqua, chairman of the Kentucky Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

Lease and transfer provisions already apply to other types of tobacco.

Interested producers should check with their County ASC office on transfer procedure, said Mr. Fuqua.

Lease and transfer of Burley tobacco quotas will be permitted among farms located within the same county. Pounds for transfer to any one farm are limited to the smaller of 15,000 pounds or 50 percent of a farm's cropland, minus the farm yield, minus the burley quota before transfer.

While transfers for the 1971 crop can be made up to Feb. 15, 1972, Burley producers were urged by Mr. Fuqua to make their transfers and the Atomic Energy Commission. During debate there were two record teller votes on proposed amendments.

The Clark Amendment eliminates \$10,000 in planning funds for the Dickey-Lincoln School project in Madison. Yeas 181, Present 1. Amendment agreed to, July 29. Mr. Watts voted no.

Whether to pass H.R. 10090, as amended. Yeas 386, Nays 4, Passed, July 29. Mr. Watts voted aye.

A Procedural Note . . . From time to time the House resolves itself into the Committee of the whole House in order to operate under the Committee's more efficient Parliamentary Rules. While in committee, members represent support of a motion by voting "Aye"; Disapproval, "No".

Bond Sales Reported

The citizens of Nicholas County bought \$2,564 of Series E and H Savings Bonds and Notes during week. Sales for the six month period totaled \$24,421 or 21.7% of the County's annual gross of \$112,100. Sales a year ago were \$27,229.

The sales for Kentucky were \$4,518,189 and cumulative sales for the whole State in the first six months totaled \$31,059,834 or 58.1% of the annual goal of \$53,400,000. This is an increase of \$2,230,623 over sales a year ago which were \$28,829,211.
