

Dr. Davis To Lead Saltwell Services

Area Medicinal Spending Local Jaycees Rank Number 1 in State

The amount of money being spent by Nicholas County residents for drugs—the medicinal kind—is large and growing larger. It is estimated that no less than \$76.50 per family is being spent annually in local drug stores for these pharmaceuticals, far more than in earlier years.

The bulk of it is for prescription drugs. The rest goes for such over-the-counter items as vitamins, cold remedies, nose drops, do not require a prescription. The local rise is in line with that observed in most areas of the country, according to reports by the U.S. Public Health Service and by industry sources.

With respect to prescription drugs, most of them are being dispensed in the South, per person, than in any other section of the country. In the North Central States, consumption is lowest. In Nicholas County's geographical region, the figures show, the average family gets about 16 prescriptions filled per year. The cost is approximately \$56.50. This compares with an average of \$49.12 per family in the United States as a whole.

Nationally, nearly \$4 billion is being spent per year for prescription drugs alone, not including those dispensed to hospital patients. That is nearly four times as much as was spent 10 years ago, according to the Health Insurance Institute.

The increase is attributed to inflation, to the fact that there are more pharmaceutical products on the market and to the fact that the per capita use of drugs has gone up. Coriaticas has much to do with the increased consumption. It is pointed out, because people over 65 use several times as many medicines as younger people do, and because the number of these elderly persons has been rising rapidly, the demand for prescription drugs is greater.

Nicholas County families are spending more than ever, also, for non-prescription drugs, their annual outlay for these items averages \$19.60. It is estimated that on that basis, the overall drug bill—prescription plus non-prescription—amounts to approximately \$76.50 a year for the local population.

The Kentucky Jaycees recently announced that the Carlisle Jaycees are the number one club in the state in "Parade of Cities" competition as of last week. The competition is based on accomplishment in both internal and external programming. There are 128 Jaycees clubs in the state, and this is the first time in the local club's history that it has led the state.

There will also be a "Swim Party" at a private pool on Saturday, Aug. 28 for those new members joining the club during Membership Week and those old members who are responsible for a new member signing during the week.

The Membership Week is being held as part of a state-wide effort to bring young men into the Jaycees. President Nixon Announces Eight Economic Proposals

President Nixon announced eight economic proposals Sunday night on national TV which will be taken to stimulate the U.S. economy. They are:

1. To impose a largely voluntary 90-day wage-price freeze.
2. To abandon the U.S. long-standing policy of selling gold to foreign governments at \$30 an ounce.
3. To impose a "temporary" average surcharge of 10 per cent on many imported products.
4. To propose new tax breaks for consumers and businessmen, including repeal of the seven-per-cent federal excise that adds an average \$200 to the cost of a new car.
5. To ask Congress to postpone

implementation of his high-priority revenue-sharing and welfare-reform proposals for three months and one year, respectively.

6. To cut federal employment by five per cent, and to impose a six-month freeze on federal pay hikes scheduled for Jan. 1.
7. To propose that businessmen be allowed rapid first-year tax writeoffs to cover 10 per cent of the cost of investments in new plants and equipment in addition to normal depreciation deductions.
8. To ask Congress to advance by one year, to next Jan. 1, the effective date of an already approved measure to permit a \$50 hike in personal exemptions for individual income taxpayers and dependents.
