ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING TERRITORY TO THE CITY OF CARLISLE, KENTUCKY - BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARLISLE, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

That the following described territory be annexed to the City of Carlisle and incorporated in the boundary thereof, and that all persons and property within said territory be subject to all ordinances and regulations of said City.

Tract 1, Beginning at a point in the margin of Kennedy Heights Street at the Southeast corner of Ryles; thence with the line of Ryles S 89 deg. 05 min. W 129 feet to a stake, corner to Alexander; thence with the line of Alexander N 9 deg. 05 min. E 144.5 feet; N 28 deg. 30 min. E 100 feet; to 40 deg. 13 min. E 119.5 feet; N 49 deg. 03 min. E 207 feet to a stake; thence N with the line of Alexander 20 deg. 20 min. W 725 feet to a stake in the line of (Unnamed) Street; thence across said street 30 feet to a point in Lot No. 27; thence in a southwest direction with the northern margin of said street to a stake at the Southwest corner of Lot No. 27; thence with the line of Alexander N 41 deg. W 120 feet to a stake; thence N 52 deg. 15 min. E 200 feet; N 47 deg. 10 min. E 241 feet to a stake, corner to Clinkenbeard; thence with the line of Clinkenbeard S 41 deg. 00 min. E 253 feet to a stake, corner to Alexander; thence with the line of Alexander S 60 deg. 10

One in 11 Americans of all ages has arthritis, he pointed out. That means that in Nicholas County

E 480 feet to a stake in the margin of Church Street; thence 30 feet across said street to a point in the Southern margin of same; thence in a Northeast direction with the Southern margin of said street approximately 200 feet to a stake, corner to Alexander; thence in a Southeast direction with the line of Alexander 160 feet to a stake, corner to Paul; thence S 57 deg. W 854 feet to the present northern limits of the City of Carlisle, at a point in the Southeast corner of Ockerman.

After passage and publication of this ordinance, as required by K.R.S. 81.210, the City Attorney shall file a petition in the Nicholas Circuit Court praying for the annexation of said territory to the City of Carlisle. Said petition and pertinent action shall be pursued to a conclusion as soon as permitted by law.
Whereupon, on motion by Councilman Hunt, seconded by Councilman Booth, and by unanimous vote of the Councilman present, this ordinance was passed and adopted this 16th day of August, 1971.
This ordinance shall be effective upon publication as required by law and judgment of the Nicholas Circuit Court approving the annexation of said territory.
