

COUNTY ASCS OFFICE
Information Center on Economic Actions

All residents of Nicholas County may obtain answers to questions on operation and interpretation of the Presidential order of August 15 on prices, rents, wages and salaries from the Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office, according to Harvey Waggoner, Chairman of the County ASCS Committee.

County ASCS offices throughout the United States have been chosen as information centers to answer questions from all citizens on Presidential Nixon's Executive Order which is designed to stem inflation and strengthen the national economy.

The Nicholas County ASCS Office is located at 46 S. Main St. The mailing address is P. O. Box 151, Carlisle, Kentucky 40311. The telephone number is 289-5367. In charge of the office is Alma Atkinson, County Executive Director. The office has a staff of two people, Fred Tolson and Athylene Soaby.

The local ASCS office and all

ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas.

County ASCS offices are set to handle complaints or appeals, he said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register then with the most convenient district or sub-district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

Neither will interpretations or guesses be made by ASCS County office people. They will answer only those questions for which they have been supplied answers, if they don't know the answer to a specific question, they will refer the question to the nearest ASCS office.

Normal function of ASCS County offices is to administer farm action programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture on the local level. County committee Chairman Waggoner said ASCS service to farmers will continue without interruption.

"Our County office people welcome the opportunity to serve their citizens and to register their views on the extra effort in this crucial period," he said.

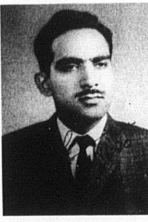
The alarm was answered by the Carlisle and Nicholas County Volunteer fire departments.
