Official registration at Western Kentucky University for freshmen and transfer students will begin Wednesday, Aug. 25 through Thursday morning, Aug. 26 in the DIDDLE Arena, according to the alphabetical list in the fall class schedule

Friday, Sept. 3 is the last day to register for a full program and Wednesday, Sept. 8 is the last day to register for a reduced program or to drop a course without a grade.

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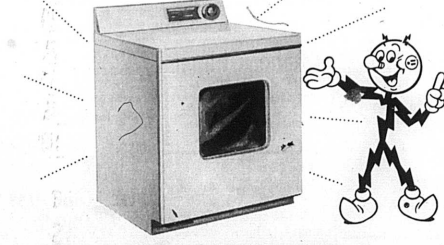
