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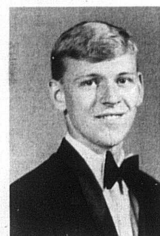

Overseas parcel deadlines set

The deadline for mailing parcel afloat Christmas packages to overseas servicemen passed Friday according to a schedule established by the U. S. Postal Service.

Deadline for airmail parcels and greeting cards to overseas servicemen is Dec. 10.

Deadline for domestic mails to distant states except Alaska and Hawaii is Dec. 1, and the card deadline is Dec. 10. For nearby areas the recommended mailing deadline is Dec. 10 for parcels and Dec. 15 for cards.

Parcels sent airmail may be mailed as late as Dec. 15 and greeting cards may be airmailed until Dec. 22.

BGI, Knitting personnel get 5 percent wage hike

Now that Phase II of the Price and Wage Freeze has been initiated, Wayne Shumate, president of Blue Grass Industries, is happy to announce a 5% wage increase for all Blue Grass Industries and Knitting personnel. This increase was to have been given on Oct. 4, 1971, but due to the President's 90 day freeze on wages and prices, it was delayed until Nov. 15, 1971. In making this announcement,

Shumate said: "The increase was made possible through the excellent quality and high productivity displayed by the personnel." This 5% increase will average from 12¢ to 15¢ per hour. During the past three years, personnel at Blue Grass have received wage increases totaling 20%, plus another paid holiday (total \$) and free life insurance added to their fringe benefits within the past year.
