It is not too early to start making cookies for the holidays ahead especially those you make and keep in your refrigerator, wrapped and ready to use when you need them. To remember this hint—if your refrigerator is one that is "rot free"—double wrap the rolls of cookie dough. I have found there is much less moisture and they will dry out if not wrapped tightly.

BUTTERSCOTCH SLICES
3 cups sifted cake flour
2 1/2 teaspoons salt
1 cup shortening
1 1/4 cups firmly packed brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg
1/4 cup sift flour, baking powder

der and salt. Cream shortening until soft, gradually beat in brown sugar, then vanilla and one egg. In a tiny stir in flour mixture, shape in a roll about two inches in diameter and wrap each roll in wax paper; chill thoroughly, and store in refrigerator. This basic recipe will make a round size dozen cookies. Naturally you cut them large there will be fewer cookies. They are better cut with an inch cutter.

The Lexington Social Security Office, along with social security offices in 80 communities around the country, has been appointed honorary secretary to the National Commission on Nursing Homes. The Commission said that among steps already taken by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to guarantee a decent environment for the older person is the creation of a new Medicare program, called Medicare Part C, which would provide for care not just for Medicare patients, but for all patients who are admitted to long-term care facilities where they are unable to be discharged.
