Mr. Ginger is recognized for his leadership at local, state and national levels. He was instrumental in developing the Minimum Foundation Program. He was chairman of a committee which studied Kentucky schools and made recommendations for their improvement.

Mr. Ginger was elected State Superintendent of Public Instruction on Nov. 7 and will take that office in January.

State Sen. Walter "Dee" Huddleston candidate for United States Senator

State Senator Walter "Dee" Huddleston announced last week at a press conference his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator. Huddleston said, "I would not seek this important office if I were not confident that I am prepared by experience and training, to serve my state and nation well in the United States Senate. I am aware of the responsibilities of the office."

A recoding of national priorities was called by Huddleston. Some taken issue with were unemployment, urban problems, and equal opportunity. "When I see the small farmers across the land with their backs to the wall economically and a president so unconcerned that he appoints a Secretary of Agriculture whose experience and allegiance is with big business, when I see a national administration so insensitive to the need for environmental improvement that he allows the polluters to set the standards I know that you want and deserve something better."

As a state campaign chairman Senator Huddleston directed the Governor Wendell Ford and the victorious campaign of Governor Ford and all the Democratic nominees in the general election. Active in state government since 1962, Huddleston was state youth chairman for U. S. Senate campaign of Wilson W. Wyatt. He has served as first vice president of the Young Democrat Club of Kentucky and is currently a member of the State Central Executive Committee of the Democratic Party. He first sought public office in 1965 when he was elected state senator from the 10th District. Senator Huddleston

was named chairman of the important state governmental committee in his first session of the General Assembly. In 1968 the Democratic members selected him as caucus chairman and in 1970 he was chosen Majority Floor Leader.

Born in Cumberland County, Kentucky in 1926, Huddleston is the seventh of eleven children of the Reverend and Mrs. W. F. Huddleston. He graduated from Jeffersonston High School in 1944 and entered the army. After serving in the army during World War II, he returned to graduate from the University of Kentucky in 1949 with a degree in Radio Arts. In 1952 he became general manager of radio station WELN in Elizabethtown. A few years later his company acquired WLEN in Lebanon which is still operating.

Huddleston is married to the former Martha Jean Pearce of Middletown. They have two sons, Stephen, a junior at the University of Kentucky and Phillip, a junior at Elizabethtown High.

Senator Huddleston stated that he already had some priorities that he would stand by first. He would not politic during the Yuletide season and he would fulfill his obligation to the new Governor and the people by remaining in the State Senate for the General Assembly. "I don't believe the people of Kentucky would want a United States Senator who is unwilling to face his responsibilities at the state level."

Ford-Carroll inaugurated

Gov. Wendell Ford was inaugurated as 49th governor of Kentucky, and Lt. Gov. Julian Carroll were installed Tuesday, Dec. 7, 1971, making the transition from Republican to Democratic state administrations.

Threatening skies and occasional drizzle kept the crowd smaller than was expected. However the parade was estimated to be the largest ever. More than 200 bands, including the Nicholas County Band, marching units and floats went the long mile from downtown Frankfort to the front of the Capitol where the inaugural ceremonies were held.

A note of interest, Gov. Ford and Lt. Gov. Carroll took the oath of office at homes of friends shortly after midnight Monday, thereby insuring a line of succession. If the unexpected should occur, all things went along in the traditional manner except usually the incoming and outgoing governor share the same automobile. This time Ford rode in an open car followed in a closed car.

Behind both was Carroll who as the cars drew up to the Capitol, went with Ford to the reviewing stand. Num did not stop there.

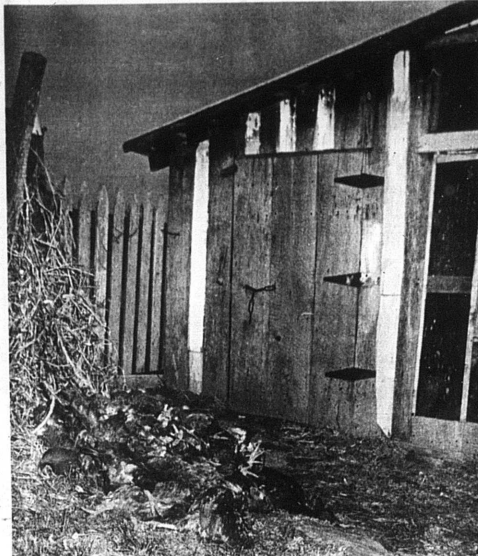

Sen. Cooper notes high burley prices

Senator John Sherman Cooper (R., Ky.) who earlier this year introduced in the Senate and secured passage of a bill to shift production controls for burley tobacco from farm acreage allotments to farm production quotas, today noted the strong demand and record-high prices received by farmers for this year's crop.

"I have noticed that price averages reached record high levels during the opening days of burley-tobacco sales and, since then, have grown stronger to the present."

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Mrs. Paul Stone is named March of Dimes chairwoman

Mrs. Paul Stone of Carlsile has been named County Campaign Director for the annual March of Dimes fund raising drive against birth defects. It was announced today by Mrs. C. C. Lowry, Honorary Kentucky March of Dimes chairwoman.

In announcing the appointment of Mrs. Stone, Mrs. Lowry said that she is among the eminent leaders in various walks of life in Nicholas County who have joined forces to insure a successful 1972 March of Dimes Drive.

"Our statewide drive will emphasize how the March of Dimes provides a vital community service, such as alerting the public to the danger of Rh disease as related to causes of birth defects."

Mrs. Lowry stated that the primary goal of the March of Dimes is prevention. A lot of birth defects could be prevented if all expectant mothers would see a doctor during the term of pregnancy.

Mrs. Stone noted "that she is looking for assistance from any and all sources throughout Nicholas County."

Retailers' price list a must

Louisville--A large majority of Kentucky retailers have no base price lists available; and only a few have taken steps to compile one as required by the Economic Stabilization Act, a recent survey by the Internal Revenue Service disclosed.

Price Commission regulations require ALL retailers to display prominently at the place of sale base prices of all food products except those exempt by commission regulations; and base price lists of 40 items in each department that have the highest dollar volume in the course of a year's sales or, as an alternative, a list of those items accounting for 50% of total dollar sales in a year. The lesser figure may be used.

The Commission allows small retailers, excluding food stores, whose annual sales are \$100,000 or less to consider themselves as

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
