**Kroger to open date food items**  
 MILWAUKEE, Wis.—The Kroger Company announced Dec. 13 that it will open date some 1300 perishable food products packed under its private label.

Announcement of the major policy decision was made in Milwaukee at a conference for consumer group leaders sponsored by the University of Wisconsin Extension and the Community Nutrition Institute of Washington, D.C., in making the announcement, Theodore Engel, vice president-grocery merchandising, Kroger Stores, said the date will indicate the final day on which the product may be offered for sale. This "pull" or final date is designed to allow the product to be at high quality for an average usage period (longer) in the customer's home after purchase.

The program is being implemented immediately by adding, starting with winners and luncheon meats, refrigerated biscuits, eggs, and margarine. By the end of 1972, he explained, 1300 private brand perishable and semi-perishable food products packed in Kroger's own processing plants or by outside manufacturers will be sold under this program.

Livestock need indoor-free water supply. A layer of ice in the water tank may cause problems for all animals, but is especially critical for nursing livestock.

A nursing cow needs to drink about five pounds of water every pound of milk she produces a day, according to Midwestern Extension veterinarians. For example, a beef cow producing 15 pounds of milk a day would need 75 pounds of water just to produce that milk.

A high-producing dairy cow may need 200 to 400 pounds of water as 40 gallons of water daily. The five pounds of water per pound of milk does not include water needed by the cow for her own daily health. Dairy cattle should have all-day access to water. The greater the access, the less chance there will be for a reduction in milk production.

A frozen water fountain or tank can affect milk production, the young animals' health and even-

 Course matching materials which are weed-free should be applied to (1) perennial border, (2) newly planted trees and shrubs, and (3) to areas planted to bulbs late this fall.

The poinsettia needs sufficient moisture to prevent drying and shedding of its leaves. After watering, any water remaining in the tray beneath the pot should be emptied—wringing the soils damp, roots and shorten the plant's life.

### Live Nativity in Bethlehem

Christmas season for 11 years, they have been gathering together to present a tableau, the "Living Nativity," in keeping with the name of the town, December 22, 23, nightly from 8:30 to 9:30, the little town of Bethlehem offers the community its guests and numerous passers-by a representation of the scriptural scenes in a melodramatic scene of the first Christmas.

The nativity scene is an enlightening Ky-22 in Henry County about 40 miles east of Louisville. It's on the map. Most of the year the highway is not too heavily traveled, but during the holiday season, traffic increases considerably. Some travelers just pull off the highway, roll their windows down and listen to the recorded music and scripture verses, while others park and walk up to the scene. There is no admission charge, and therefore no real way to determine how many visit the display, but it is agreed by the representatives of the three churches sponsoring the scene that upwards of 15,000 people each year have attended.

The animals are amazingly good in their roles and they get to the stage. They do display one trait, however, that seems to be ingrained in all of God's creatures, and that is in their actions when they object to being caught, tied with ropes and led to the stage. The same animals are used from year to year. Once the burrows run away and it took eight men several hours, running in different directions up and down the highway, to retrieve them. Several years ago, on Christmas Eve the scene had a baby lamb. The new baby was welcomed by thousands, since a television crew from Louisville was there, taping a show.
