1792 Ky. Legislators received \$1 per day

When the state's legislators convene here Jan. 4, they will find things far different than when the first General Assembly met in 1792.

Although their facilities are described as inadequate, today's senators and representatives have comfortable chambers, electronic vote tabulators, prefilled bills and interim committees to help make legislating easier.

Those first legislators probably would have been happy just to have been paid on time.

They made only a dollar a day, and as there was as yet no treasury, money had to be borrowed to pay them.

They convened June 4, 1792, in a hot, stuffy two-story log house in Lexington which had been selected as temporary capital. Gov. Isaac Shelby was inaugurated also that day.

Only three days before, on June 1, Kentucky had officially become the 15th state of the union and Lexington's streets were filled with happy crowds cheering their new statehood.

While others celebrated, the young legislature faced the task of creating laws, collecting revenue and organizing a government of long age.

Legislators to review approximately 100 bills

The women's camp amendment, now being studied by the Legislative Research Commission, would increase benefits for Marching women and raise burial benefits.

The proposal to boost the minimum wage to \$1.30 per hour statewide has been endorsed by the subcommittee of the Committee on Labor and Industry. It has not yet been approved by the entire legislature.

Kentucky's current minimum wage for non-manufacturing workers is \$1.00 and 65 cents over the rest of the state.

Farmers and extension workers would benefit from two bills being proposed by the subcommittee on Agriculture.

One proposal would require labeling of commercial feeds for livestock.

The legislature also will have to consider creation of a new environmental department and a severance tax on coal.

For the lawmakers, the public should anticipate 100 interesting days.
