Products are made privately through direct bargaining between the timber grower and the buyer. The information obtained in the price report is obtained by interviewing a large number of forest product buyers over the state. Field personnel of the Division of Forestry collect the information and it is compiled and published by the Department of Forestry at the University.

For price reporting purposes, the state is divided into seven marketing zones. Prices for some

Over all production in 1971 was about half the 1970 rate. Demand is not expected to change much until at least mid-1972. The new pulp mills in west Kentucky and other chipping plants have expanded the pulp market over more of the state.
