## Sen. Blake Named Ford Chairman

Former State Senator H. Stanley Blake has been appointed Nicholas County Ford for Governor Campaign Chairman.

The appointment was announced here today by Lt. Gov. Ford's state campaign chairman, Sen. Walter "Doc" Huddleston of Hillsbottom.

"We are proud to announce this appointment," Huddleston said, "and we feel a man of Senator Blake's outstanding record of leadership, both on the local and state level, is the type of man who will lead an effective and winning campaign for Wendell Ford in Nicholas County."

Sen. Blake, who served in the State Senate with Lt. Gov. Ford's father, represents the 38th Senatorial District for 24 consecutive years. He served in the State Senate under six different Kentucky Governors.

Sen. Blake is the author of Kentucky's 18-year-old voting Bill. (Second in the nation), as well as the present State Soil Conservation Act, known as the Blake-Robinson Act.

Blake, now a tobacco warehouseman and farmer, is a Deacon in the Carlisle Baptist Church. "Kentucky needs a change in its governmental structure," Blake said, "a structure which has, in the past, been built for special interest groups and a select few."

"I have known Wendell Ford for many years and I feel he is the only young, aggressive, determined Democrat willing and capable of leading this state forward."

"For these reasons," Blake said, "I thoroughly endorse Wendell Ford for governor in 1971."
