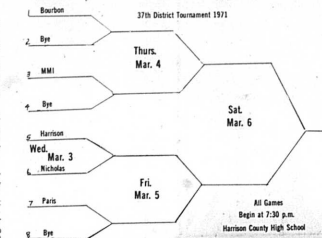

Senior Citizens Warned Of False Representation

Social Security Officials have received a number of complaints from alarmed senior citizens in the Lexington and surrounding area being approached by men posing as representatives of Medicare.

Two men are known to be involved in a high-pressure sales attempt to persuade Medicare recipients to buy additional insurance, says Ray L. Colyer, Social Security Administration district manager.

"One man used the name of an employee of the Social Security Office when trying to gain entrance into an elderly woman's home."

Another individual tried to read the license plate of the car one impostor was driving, but it was covered with mud. Colyer said, Colyer cautioned elderly people to ask for identification from any person claiming to be a Medicare representative.

"Authorized agents carry a card with picture issued by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare," he said.

Commissioner Robert Miller may seek the Republican nomination to oppose Mary Louise Pogue for the State Auditor's post in November.

House Republican R.K. Keith has been mentioned as a possible candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture and Charles O. (Curry) Wheeler of Johnson County has been mentioned as a candidate for Clerk of the Court of Appeals.

On the Democratic side, both Combs and Ford have begun to step up their campaigns with more frequent fund-raising events in various sections of the state.

The Democrats have a three-way race for lieutenant governor—House Speaker Julian Carroll who is running with Combs, plus Atty. Gen. John Breckinridge and State Senator Henry Beach of Louisville. Ford has observed a hands-off policy so far in this race.

Ed Hancock, a Frankfort attorney, is seeking the attorney general's nomination as is former State Senator Lambert Hehl of Northern Kentucky.

Mrs. Thelma Sovall will seek the post of Secretary of State. She isn't expected to have any serious opposition from within her own party.

Drexell Davis will be opposed for the Democrat nomination for State Treasurer by C.L. Cuffill of Bowling Green.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Wendell Butler is eyeing his old post as agriculture commissioner. He switches between the two.

Dr. Lyman V. Glinger, on leave from the University of Kentucky, and Henderson County School Superintendent Lewis Johnson are seeking the nomination for Superintendent of Public Instruction.
