Tom T. Hall, a native of Olive Hill, will be among the more than 30 country music stars appearing in the Miners' Benefit Show at the state fair ground in Louisville, March 1, 6 p.m.

The program is being organized by vocalist Loretta Lynn, another native Kentuckian, to raise money for the families of 38 miners killed in a mine explosion near Hyden Dec. 30.

Born in Olive Hill, May 29, 1936, Hall became interested in music at an early age but also had ambitions of being an author. It is no surprise he became a songwriter.

He attended Roanoke (Va.) College then began traveling, working at an endless variety of jobs which have provided a rich background for song ideas.

The benefit program will last some six hours with performers donating all proceeds to the mine victims' families. Emphasis is being placed on providing education for the more than 104 children who lost their fathers in the disaster.

A tireless writer, Hall has turned out six number-one records in the past seven years. His hits include "Harper Valley PTA," "The Pool Shark" and "Week in a Country Jail."

He has also been popular as a singer with such hits as "I Washed My Face in the Morning Dew" and "Ballad of Furry Dollars," other native Kentuckians appearing in the show will include Loretta Lynn, Peggy Sue, the Osborne Brothers, Fee Wee King, David Seviour and Bill Monroe.

Farmer Escapes Serious Injury As Bridge Collapses with Truck



Owens Junior Ockerman, Carlisle Route 2, (Upper Sharpburg Road) narrowly escaped serious injury or possible death when his loaded truck fell into Somerset Creek early last Thursday afternoon.

The truck was traveling south on the Carlisle-East Union Road when the attempted crossing of an old metal bridge at the juncture of that road with Ky. 37 resulted in the accident.

The bridge carried a warning sign limiting loads to 3-ton, and a replacement bridge just down stream was on the state highway department drawing boards. A new bridge will replace the old span when plans are completed and a contract let for its construction.

The bridge is estimated to have been constructed in the late teens or early twenties. About eight years ago, Halloween pranksters set the floor afire. A new floor was put in by Joe Ball.

Skid marks showed plainly on the bridge's floor surface where Ockerman attempted to stop the vehicle's forward motion as the bridge began to sag. The marks do not show well enough in any of the pictures to focus attention to them.
