FRANKFORT—Most legislators who come to Frankfort for the special reapportionment session hold a host of misgivings about the working plans submitted by the Legislative Research Commission.

- 1. Wear any recommended protective clothing or device—gloves, head and eye protection, skin cover, etc. Toxic chemicals can cause harm if they get on the skin, or are inhaled or swallowed.

- 2. Keep children and animals away from mixing, spraying or dusting areas. 3. Follow the correct concentration of dose and mix carefully, according to instructions or recommendations.

- 4. Use spray equipment to deliver the recommended application correctly. Empty and flush the equipment to get proper coverage and minimize drift. Travel away from the drift. Don't spray when it is windy.

- 5. Be very careful in applying pesticides to get proper coverage and minimize drift. Travel away from the drift. Don't spray when it is windy.

- 6. Wash up and change clothing when you come in from work. Don't smoke or eat in the work area or before you clean up your clothes.

- 7. Store pesticides in their original, labeled and tightly-closed containers. Keep them away from children and animals, preferably locked in a special cabinet, room or building. Never store them where they could contaminate human or animal foods.

- 8. Dispose of empty pesticide containers as soon as possible, keeping them in a secure storage place until this can be done. Do not reuse them.
