Accompanied with this article is a picture of Donita Jean Smart, a birth defect victim, currently being helped by the Nicholas County Chapter of the March of Dimes.

Donita, age nine, is the daughter of Don and Rose Smart. The official medical name of her defect is megacolon. During 1970 she was admitted to major surgery (resection of the colon) and was hospitalized at the St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington for 23 days. Donita is still under a doctor's care.

The financial support given by the Nicholas County Chapter of the March of Dimes has been a help. Don and Rose say you may realize just how expensive this type of care is. There are, of course, a number of worthwhile charities that citizens of Carlisle and Nicholas County are asked to give to but we feel that this charity should have a special place in everyone's heart inasmuch as children are involved.

New Simplified System For Welfare Recipients

Welfare recipients in Nicholas County will be doing some of their own paper work soon thus giving social workers more time to help people.

On Dec. 15 a "simplified method" system for applying for public assistance went into effect.

Merritt S. Deitz, Jr., said the simplified system is designed to cut down on red tape involved in determining the eligibility of persons applying for aid.

They fill out the forms themselves, return them to the public assistance office and then a social worker determines whether their personal and financial status makes them eligible for aid.
