'Housing Authority' Created To Eliminate Unsanitary And Unsafe Housing in City

The "Housing Authority of Carlisle" was created by City Council at its regular meeting Monday night. The Housing Authority was established to eliminate unsanitary and unsafe housing within the boundaries of the City.

Four persons were appointed by Mayor Bill Power and approved by Council to serve on the Housing Authority. They are: Rev. Herman Kamlage, Bill Carter, both Democrats, and Mrs. Christine Miller and R. L. Talbert, Republicans. These appointments will serve without pay until Jan. 18, 1975. The vote on both resolutions was 4-1 with Clifton Vaughn voting "no." Charles Wilson was absent.

A condemnation ordinance was passed by Council by a vote of 4-1. Vaughn again voted "no." The ordinance was necessary because O. L. Berry refuses to grant an easement across his property so that the city can provide sewer services to the newly annexed property of East Main.

Council agreed to advertise for applications for an Assistant Sewer Attendant. The person will be hired to learn the utilities system as a back-up man.

Marvin Caswell and Joe Sapp were given permission to look into the City's water and gas lines. The meter problems will be worked out at a later date.

Only 893 auto stickers have been sold to date and expiration date was Jan. 15. Elliot Allen Earlywine was instructed to check autos carefully and to give tickets to those without the stickers.

Deputy City Manager Oliver Vico said that the gas detector, purchased by the city, has been effective. 13 gas leaks have been found to date and eight of those have already been repaired.

Carlisle Jaycees Start Public Opinion Survey Local Jaycee Projects

This week, Jan. 17-23, is being observed as "Jaycee Week," in commemoration of the founding of the Jaycee movement in St. Louis in 1919. From that time on, it has expanded into an organization with more than 300,000 members in 6400 communities.

The Carlisle Jaycees have been providing leadership training through community service since 1959. This year's training program, among the projects being carried on by the local club during this Jaycee year are a Community Survey to determine areas of need in the community, "Do Something" to enable volunteer projects to fill these needs; Environmental Improvement; development of community recreational facilities with the Jaycees pledging \$3000 for city recreation park development; Drug Abuse program; "Money Sunday" with proceeds going to mental health and mental restoration programs; Walking Good Bands; Gun Safety Program; Law Enforcement program.

Help with "March of Dimes" program; organized protest of treatment of American prisoners of War in Vietnam; Flag project; "What America Means to Me"

Jaycee Horse Show, Lake Carlisle Boat Tours; Emergency Medical Services program. Recognition of Outstanding Young Farmers; Outstanding Young Farm-ers; Outstanding Young Educator; Outstanding Citizens; Outstanding Young Men; participation in Black-berry Festival; Fika Market; picnic table sales; Christmas Parade; Inter-church Attendance; providing Santa Claus for children; Little League Football and Basketball, and many others.
