### NICHOLAS COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT

**Scale For Establishing Eligibility For Free and Reduced-Price Meals For 1970-71 Annual Income**

It is the policy of the Nicholas County Board of Education to provide lunches free or at a reduced price to those children determined by each school principal to be unable to pay the full price for their lunches. The policy provides that an application form be completed and returned to the school. Copies of this form have been sent both in a letter to parents, and additional copies may be obtained at the principal's office in each school. The form itself is simple to complete the requests information needed to determine economic need, based on the gross family income, the number of persons in the family, the number of children in school or service institutions, and any unusual circumstances of hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility for free and reduced-price lunches. Under the provisions of the policy, the officials designated above will make the determination of individual eligibility. The following family size-income scale which the Nicholas County Board of Education has adopted for use system-wide will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price lunches. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the school principal, he may make a request, either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. The request should be made to D. P. Parsley, Superintendent, at the Nicholas County 4031. The hearing will be conducted in accordance with the procedures as outlined in the
