They merely want to exploit the society in which they live and take advantage of its generosity and tolerance.

History-minded citizens recall that at times of breakdown in civilizations there is a turn toward nomadism. Bands of ruffians inhabit once proud cities. We are witnessing the same phenomenon in our own time and country. In Atlanta, Ga., for example, biggie "street people" have made some streets unsafe for respectable people.

On the West Coast, much of the superb Pacific coast is being lost to the "street people." Bizarre crimes and disease are the results of this flood of wanderers who refuse to take up any duties in the society which they live.

Tolerance of the wanderers has been unduly extended. As the "street people" spread their drug culture and infect communities—quite literally—with physical disease, as well as the disease of the spirit, it is becoming imperative that organized society take steps to break up the ruffian bands of wanderers.
