

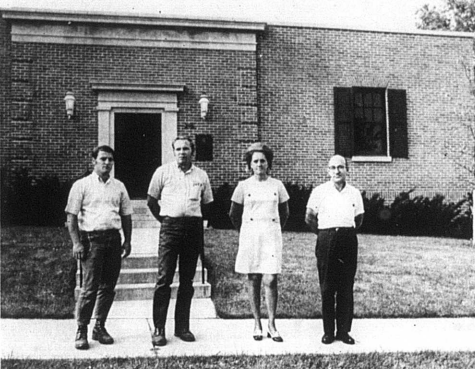


Burley Tobacco Growers Reminded Not To Use DDT or TDE on Leaf Crop

The Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association has issued a reminder to tobacco producers that the use of the insecticides DDT or TDE on their leaf crops will make the tobacco crop ineligible for price support.

Tobacco producers will again be required to certify that they did not use DDT or TDE on their tobacco crops after transplanting if they wish to receive price support.

At the same time, the Burley Co-op, which administers the price support program in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia and Missouri, said growers should be

Local Area A \$2,695,000 Food Market SR&DS Says

How much is the average family in Nicholas County spending per year in local retail stores? How does the spending pattern locally compare with that of other areas of the country?

Answers to these questions are provided by the Standard Rate and Data Service in its annual report on consumer markets, just released.

It reveals, for each community, the amount that was spent in the past year for food, clothing, cars, furniture and other commodities.

The sales volume in these stores came to a grand total of \$2,695,000, as compared with the previous year's \$2,387,000.

In addition to this outlay, a sizeable amount was spent in lunch rooms, restaurants and other places where food and drink are consumed on the premises.

Those specializing in wearing apparel accounted for \$596,000. The previous year's total was \$593,000.

Sales of furniture and other home furnishings added up to \$243,000. Last year they amounted to \$263,000.

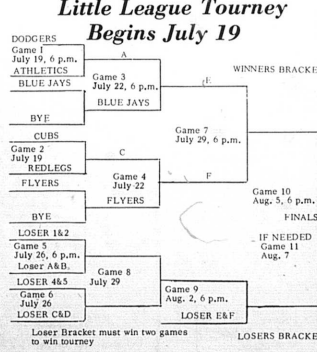
out of every dollar spent in local retail stores was for take-home food. It was more than in many communities.

Throughout the United States generally, 22 cents was so spent and, in the State of Kentucky, 23 cents.

On a per family basis, if the total food bill were distributed equally among the local population, it would have amounted to \$1,162 per family for the year.

General merchandise and department stores reported volume of \$204,000, as against \$191,000 in 1969.
