## New Burley Pounding Program Explained

Paul Punga, Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee has emphasized the importance of each farm operator being made aware of the regulations relative to leasing and marketing Burley tobacco quotas from other farms. If marketing from a farm are less than the farm's own quota in any year, the difference (up to 100 percent) will be added to the farm's quota for the following year. Marketing from a farm may ex-

ceed the farm quota by 10 percent without penalty and with price support. In this case the poundage quota for the following year will be reduced by the amount of over-marketing for the previous year. The farmer may lease quotas from other farms in the same county up to Feb. 15 of the current marketing year (1971-1972). Any quota leased to a farm must be given to the lessee's farm and must be identified on the marketing card, issued for that farm.

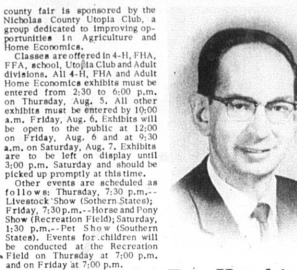
