Try these summer coolers for yourself, your family and your friends. It is a bit more trouble than opening a can or your refrigerator, but you are watching your diet away from the ice cream float, but you can enjoy the fruit drinks.

MIST SPRAY

11 ounce jar mist jelly
3 cups unsweetened pineapple juice
1/2 cup lemon juice
3/2 cups ginger ale
Combine mist jelly and 1/2 cup water. Heat and stir over low heat till jelly melts. Cool. Add pineapple juice and lemon juice. To serve, place ice cubes in tall glass; fill 1/2 with fruit mixture. Fill remaining half with ginger ale. Stir to blend.

FRUIT GINGER ALE

Combine and boil for 5 minutes:
1 cup sugar and 1 cup water. Cool then add juice of 6 oranges and juice of 4 lemons. Before serving add 1 quart of chilled ginger ale. Serve over ice.

LEMONADE SYRUP

Boil for 5 minutes 2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup water, rind of 2 lemons cut into thin strips, dash of salt. Cool and add the juice of 2 lemons. Strain and strain in covered jar. To use, add 2 tablespoons syrup to each glass of water over ice.

FRUITED ICE TEA

2 tablespoons instant tea
5 cups cold water
1 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup orange juice
1 cup fruit juice
Combine tea and cold water. Strain until smooth. Add corn syrup, orange juice, and lime juice. Mix thoroughly. Chill. Serve over ice in tall glasses.

MOCHA PUNCH

Prepare and chill 4 cups freshly made coffee; whip until stiff peaks form. Add coffee to 1 quart of whipped cream. Fold in remainder of ice cream and all but a cup of the whipped cream. Place the punch in tall glasses. Garnish with reserved whipped cream and grated semi-sweet chocolate.

CHOCOLATE FLOAT

Melt together 1 square (1 ounce) unsweetened chocolate; 2 tablespoons sugar. Stir in 1/2 cup strong hot coffee. Add 2 cups hot



PUNCH SODA

Mix together 1 chilled 6 ounce can of fruit punch and 1/2 cup lemon juice. Scoop 1 pint vanilla ice cream into 10 glasses. Add half the punch mixture, middle. Add remaining punch.
