'Stephen Foster Story' To Open Saturday

"The Stephen Foster Story", Hardaway's outdoor musical drama, will open its 13th season June 19, under new direction and with new locale according to Bert Hullard, General Manager of the show. Appearing as the 1971 Stephen Foster will be Roger King, of Louisville, a graduate of Huntington College of Montgomery, Ala., and the University of Louisville. King is remembered for the role of Samson in the Louisville premier of Samuel Barber's "Venetian". Additionally, he has appeared with the Springer Theatre Company of Columbus, Ga., the Kentucky Opera Association, and the Louisville Bach Society. Stephen's Journey is played this year by Diane Mabry. Miss Mabry has performed with the Louisville Bach Society, the Kentucky Opera Association, and the Indiana University Opera Theatre. Holding degrees from Westminster Choir College, Princeton, New Jersey, Miss Mabry has received additional training at Indiana University and at the Hochschule fur Musik in Hamburg, Germany. Directing the show will be Lawrence Kelley, Assistant Professor

of Drama at Eastern Kentucky University. Richmond, who has worked as an assistant director for the past five seasons. Holding degrees in music and drama, Kelley is a graduate of Georgetown College and has studied at the University of Kentucky and Western Kentucky University at the Alley Playhouse, Bowling Green, and community theatre groups at Franklin, Scottsville, and Owensboro.

Joining the Drama as Musical Director is Gary Horton, who has appeared as soloist with the Louisville Orchestra, the Oklahoma City Opera Company, the Tulsa Philharmonic, the Kentucky Opera Association, Indiana University Opera Theatre, and the Louisville Bach Society. U.S. Army Training Center, Orlando, Fla. He is a candidate for the Doctor of Music Degree at Indiana University. Returning to the production as Chorographer is Scott Ray, a member of the dance faculty at New York's Genesee State College.

Ray has appeared in four Broadway and off-Broadway shows and in summer stock. He has studied at Indiana University and the University of Utah. Performances of "The Stephen Foster Story" will be presented from June 19 through September 5 at 8:30 p.m., EDT with an additional performance scheduled for each Sunday at 3 p.m., beginning June 27. There are no shows on Monday.

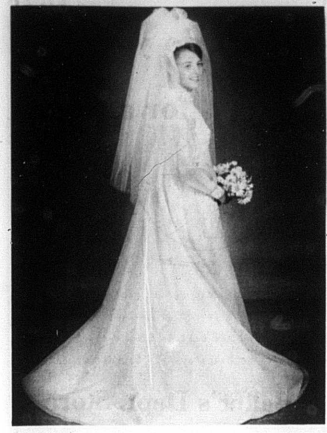

Attend Annual Conference

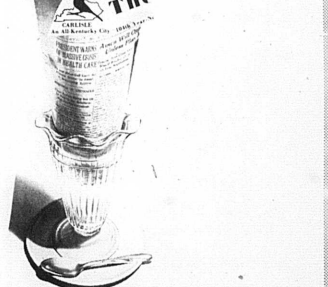
