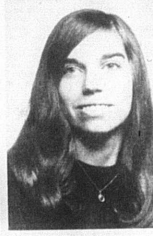
Queen Candidates Selected; Festival To Open July 1

City Council Votes To Raise Residential Trash Pickup Rates

City Council voted 4-2 to raise residential trash pickup rates from \$1 to \$1.50 per month at its meeting last Monday night.
The trash rates, business and residential, had been discussed at other meetings because revenue was falling \$200 short of expenses each month.
Councilman Jane Ellen Booth presented the motion after several businessmen came to contest their rates. She said the city was charging many businessmen more than trash than the businesses.
Jefferson Barret, Barnett Refuse Co., came before council and explained his proposal to collect trash in Carlisle. He said he had trucks that met State Health Department standards. He had contracted Millerburg's trash and was planning to see other communities in the area. Council decided to consider his proposal.
In other action Russell Alexander asked Carlisle to annex Catherine Street in Kennedy Heights to the city. Council agreed to take necessary legal steps with the understanding that streets and gutters be completed according to subdivision regulations.
Council also accepted a low bid of \$5,750.25 from Hinkle Concrete Corp. for paving Douglas Court and the alley behind Hunt's Service Station. The job is to be completed by August 1.

Health Grant Is Approved

The Bluegrass Regional Health Planning Council has been informed that their five year operating grant had been approved.
The Council member from Nicholas County is Dr. Wendell Kingsolver, Environmental Health Committee, who has been instrumental in this Council's effectiveness.

New Wheat Allotment

A new farm wheat allotment may be established for the 1972 crop of wheat for farms that did not have a 1971 allotment if they meet eligibility requirements, Harvey Waggoner of the Nicholas County ASCS Committee announced today.
A 1972 wheat allotment will be established automatically for all farms that had a wheat allotment in 1971.
To be eligible for a new farm allotment, the operator must expect to receive 50 percent more of this income from farming. Neither the owner or the operator may have an interest in any other farm which has a 1972 wheat allotment, and the person making application must have had at least two years experience in the last five years in producing wheat.
Applications for a new farm allotment must be filed in the county office on or before June 30.

Two-Car Collision in Bourbon Claims Two Sisters; Accidents Plague Nicholas Countians Over Weekend

Two Nicholas County sisters, Mrs. Lesale Snapp Burden, 71 and Mrs. Gladys Gaunce, 69, both of Carlisle, Route 3, were injured fatally in a two-car collision on U.S. 68, five miles northeast of Paris, Saturday afternoon.
Police said Mrs. Gaunce was pronounced dead at the scene, while Mrs. Burden was pronounced dead about 40 minutes later at the Bourbon County Hospital, Paris.
A passenger in the car with the sisters, Mrs. Alberta Snapp, also of Carlisle, Route 3, was injured in the crash and was admitted to the Bourbon County Hospital.
Two occupants of the other car involved in the collision - Calvin Douglas Keller, 21, identified as the driver, and George Bille, 15, both of Paris, were treated at the hospital for cuts and bruises and were dismissed, police said.
State Trooper David Corbin and Bourbon County Deputy Sheriff Dickie Brunner said the car driven by Mrs. Burden was traveling toward Carlisle when, according to witnesses, the auto suddenly swerved to the left and narrowly missed one oncoming vehicle, cut back to the right, and again swerved left, where it was struck in the right rear wheel in the left lane. By the other car, driven by Keller.



Driver Walks Away

Both Mrs. Bille and Mrs. Gaunce were thrown from the car on the left side of the road. Bourbon County Coroner Bruce Forsythe said they suffered multiple injuries. Mrs. Snapp was still in the car, which was knocked back to the right side of the road. A light rain was falling when the accident occurred shortly after 3 p.m. on the road.
Both cars were totally losses. The deaths were taken to the city's fifth and sixth auto fatalities this year.
The bodies were taken to the Mathers-Shearer Funeral Home, Carlisle.
Mrs. Burden was a native of Nicholas County and a member of the Epworth Methodist Church. She is survived by her husband, W.C. Burden.
Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, at the Mathers-Shearer Chapel, Carlisle. Burial in the Bereanville Cemetery. Pallbearers: Charles W. Tanser II, Maxwell and Hanson B. Burden, Herb Allison, Roy Snapp and Frazier Earlywine.
Mrs. Gaunce was a native of Nicholas County and a member of the Headquarter's Methodist Church. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. John R. Cox, Lexington and a grandson, Johnny Cox.
Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Tuesday from Mathers-Shearer Chapel, Carlisle by Rev. Tommy Fryman and Rev. Howard Ruchlin. Burial in the Carlisle Cemetery. Pallbearers: H.C. Allen, Russ, Bruce, Paul, Smiley and James Gaunce. Honorary bearers will be Deacons of the Headquarters Church.
