Third Of Older Couples Collect Top Social Security Benefits

A survey of five million older couples who collect social security retirement benefits showed that one-third of them receive payments of \$160 a month or more, according to Ray L. Colyer, social security district manager in Lexington. Colyer cited a recent study of married couples with one or both members 65 or over who collect social security benefits. The study also indicated that about 20 percent of the older couples collect social security benefits. In the second-highest bracket, \$140 to \$160 a month, about 15 percent of the couples collect benefits in the \$115-\$140 bracket, about 14 percent in the \$90-\$115 bracket, and about 18 percent in the under-\$90 bracket. Men and women may begin collecting full monthly retirement benefits based on their own earnings record at 65—or an actuarially reduced benefit at 62, Colyer said. A wife may collect social security retirement benefits if she receives an amount equal to half of his benefit when she's 65—or earlier if she has dependent children. She also may receive reduced benefits between 62 and 65 even if she has no dependent children. A wife may collect social security on her own record if such benefits are higher than her benefits as a wife, Ray L. Colyer said. 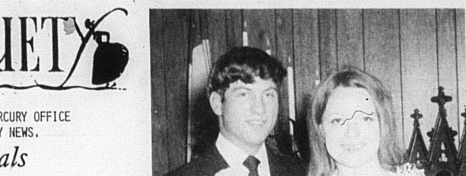
